THE TRUTH ABOUT OSCEOLA.

Story of his friend Ochoa Bill. Part of an interview between the veteran Col. Billie Fisher (Ochoa Bill) the fast friend of Osceola and a New Orleans Herald reporter. Finally, however, I was induced to return to the white settlements, and engaged as a stock agent for a large owner. At one time a party of our stock-tenders, going to hunt cattle, came across some Indians who had killed and were engaged in skinning some of the cattle. Now it was doubtful whether these heaves did not belong to the Indians, for our stock-dealers were in the habit of catching and branding all the wild cattle they could overtake in the swamps; but the young men, without waiting to inquire or inform themselves on the subject, fired on the Indians and killed five. When these young men returned and told me what they had done, I said: "Now, boys, you are going to have hell in this region; there are twenty-five hundred warriors who can be hurled upon these posts, and it will take all Uncle Sam's strength to whip them. Look out now for lively times. And sure enough into our camp the next night glided my Seminole girl, who had traveled fifty miles through the swamps, and informed me that the warriors had put on their paint, had danced the war dance, and I had better hurry to the nearest post and get under protection of United States troops. I was at first incredulous, because I knew the old chief Charley was an octogenarian, and ever since he fought against Jackson in 1817, had been a strong peace man, and always dissuaded the young men from having any quarrels with the whites. As soon as I suggested this ground of my doubts as to the accuracy of her report, the girl told me that as soon as old Charley began his peace talk, the young chiefs went for him and chopped him into mince meat with their tomahaws, and that Osceola was chosen chief, and had taken the field with his warriors. I then knew it was all true, but there were white people who did not believe it, and paid the penalty of their scalps for their skepticism. Then began the long and bloody war which you will find occupying a good many pages of our history.

twenty years? And so it proved. Osceola died a few weeks after at Sullivan's Island, off Charleston, and his successor, Sam Jones, and other chiefs made it pretty lively in Florida for twenty years afterwards, until at last, by more treachery, more white flags and much whiskey, the United States did what it could never do by fair and legitimate warfare - cleared Florida of as noble a race of warriors as ever stepped the soil of America, to which, by-the-by, they had a better title than the whites who now occupy the country. And here the veteran, becoming rather dry, and somewhat excited by his long and interesting narrative, begged that we would pay him a visit to his ranche, at Carrollton, and he would entertain us for many hours and days with the reminiscences of a most eventful life, and in regard to incidents in our Southern history which have been falsely narrated in all the published histories, and of which he is, perhaps, the only person now living who can give testimony founded on personal knowledge.

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Death's Dolour.

Anderson Henderson, a well known colored man of this city, more familiarly known as "Anderson the Baggage Man," died in this city yesterday morning between 9 and 10 o'clock, aged about 60 years. He had been sick for about three months. Anderson had been engaged in the city express business for a long time and had, by strict integrity, sobriety, and attention to duty, won the esteem of a large proportion of both the white and colored people of the city. His funeral will take place at his late residence on Campbell, between Third and Fourth streets, this afternoon, at 2 1/2 o'clock.
