Highway Robbery and Assault Upon Two Little Boys.
A daily dandy of about 40 years of age, with a fine, but a prepossessing appearance, and answering to the name of O'Neil, was arrested by Special Deputy R. L. Sellers, yesterday morning, on the charge of assault and battery and highway robbery. She was carried before Justice Woodford yesterday afternoon, at 5 o'clock, for the purpose of undergoing a preliminary examination. From the evidence it appears that on Saturday last, two little white boys, Armond J. DeRoset and Willie Parsley, were going from Union Depot in the direction of Hilton, when they came upon the accused sitting on the side of the road digging sand. Upon approaching the girl she suddenly sprang upon Master Parsley and commenced slapping him, finally releasing him and seizing Armond by the collar of his shirt and same, and proceeded to remove and drag him from him. After releasing the boys, they started in the direction of the depot, where they were met by Mr. DeRoset, who with a revolver, proceeded to whom they recited the circumstances of the outrage. He returned with the little boys to the place where they left the girl, but she had disappeared. They then proceeded in another direction, made a short circuit and came back to the same spot, where they found the accused. She was about to run with the view of again fleeing, but she was ordered here to stop, telling her that she knew her and she would give her nothing by running. She then halted until Mr. E. came up, whereupon she questioned her about the assault upon the boys, when she endeavored to excuse her conduct by saying that they had given her impudence. Upon being asked for the things she got one of them in fine gold ring from a little girl she had with her and gave it up, but stated that the other one had been broken. They then left her and subsequently a warrant was issued for her arrest, with the result mentioned.

After hearing the evidence on both sides, Justice Woodford required the defendant to give security for her appearance at Court, in the sum of \$100 in the case of assault and \$500 in the case of highway robbery, in default of which she was committed to jail.

Richmond H. Leake, colored, formerly a member of the police force, being one of the number recently suspended by Mayor Canaday, was arrested yesterday, on a warrant sworn-out by Joseph C. Hill, Superintendent of St. Stephen's A. M. E. Church Sunday School, charged with embezzling funds belonging to the school. The case came up before Justice T. M. Gardner, who required the defendant to give security in the sum of \$200 for his appearance at the next term of the Superior Court.
