DEATH OF HIRAM POWERS. The telegraph announces the death of this distinguished American sculptor at Florence. Mr. Powers has resided continually abroad since 1837, making his home at Rome and Florence, the scenes of his artistic triumphs, which have been many. His greatest work, or at least the one that has brought him most fame, was his "Greek Slave," about whose excellencies the critics are much divided. The country is, however, full of his works, and his name has become a

household word throughout the land. It was but the other day that his statue of Franklin, ordered thirty years ago, was installed with great pomp in New Orleans. During the war Mr. Powers rendered himself very unpopular in the South by his almost fanatical zeal for the Union. Exactly what rank he will take in history as an artist we are not prepared to say, but he has long been acknowledged a chief among American sculptors.
