CHARLES A. DANA. This gentleman edits the New York Sun, a bold newspaper which has for two years past lashed the corruptionists of every degree in the Radical party. By his fearless exposures of official rascality he had subjected himself to a number of libel suits. Rather than put himself in the clutches of a Pennsylvania court, which he mistrusted as being in collusion with the prosecutor, the notorious Kemble of "Addition, Division and Silence" notoriety, whom the Sun had exposed for his Philadelphia ring operations, Mr. Dana forfeited his bond of \$5,000. But he is now sued by the Washington Board of Public Works for charging them with large frands. The editor of the Sun, a paper published in New York, is bound over in a heavy bond to answer before a court in the District of Columbia a charge of libel ! This unusual proceeding is had under the principle of constructive libel, by which the publication of a libel is assumed to be in every place where the paper circulates-a principle utterly false and pernicious, dangerous to liberty and subversive of all legal authority. Now it will be a spectacle for Americans when Mr. Dana is brought before this, to him, foreign jurisdiction for trial on a charge only cognizable before a New York Court. But so many things contrary to law,

to justic and to public decency have been done under the present regime that we suppose nobody will be shocked at this outrage. The free newspapers of the land must do as the Baltimore Gazette and a few other outspoken journale have done, denounce the trammelling of the press by truculent individuals who avail themselves of the convenient machinery of corrupt judges and venal juries to wreak their purposes of hate and pelf. The independent press must break down this infamous tyranny, as it proposes to break down other corruptions and abuses. Of the merits of this particular case we know nothing; we have only to say that the reputation of the Washington Board of Public Works is not unimpeachable Of Mr. Dana we know only that since he left the Radical party he has been busy in exposing its shams and shames.
