An Attempted Outrage—Arrest of the Criminal.

Robert Murphy, colored, was brought to this city yesterday, under a commitment from Justice S. E. Fillyaw, of Union Township, charged with having attempted to commit the crime of rape upon a respectable white girl of Holly Township on Thursday last week. The parents of the little girl, who is only about 10 years of age, were absent from home at the time. The villain was detected in the attempt by an elder sister, who raised an alarm, when Murphy, becoming frightened, desisted from his criminal designs and fled. He was arrested by Deputy Sheriff Rivenbark on Sunday morning, by whom he was brought to this city yesterday, securely iraped, and lodged in the county jail. Fortunately the only injury received by the little girl was a bruise on one of her limbs when she was seized by the scoundrel in his effort to carry out his purpose. He subsequently abused and threatened the members of the family present, loading his pistol and firing it off in their presence, &c.

Elder Paul Bagley, of the Christian Church (Disciples), and formerly Bible distributor in China, delivered a discourse in the First Baptist Church of this city last Sunday afternoon on the "Triumphs of Christianity."

Killing a Rabbit with a Horsewhip.

The rabbit noticed his movements, however, and as soon as he commenced approaching in the direction of his place of concealment he wheeled and made a dash in the opposite direction. Just as he did so the gentleman, who held the whip poised in his hand, let it fly at the retreating rabbit, and upon going to get his whip found the animal lying by its side, the heavy end of the whip having struck him on the head just behind one of his ears. This is one of the best shots on record.

Probable Homicide.

At Brown Marsh, Bladen county, on Monday, a colored man, by the name of Solomon Lennon shot Alex. Robinson, also colored, severely wounding him in the left side. It seems that Lennon had been arrested on a bail warrant issued at the instance of Robinson, but escaped and made his way into South Carolina, at the same time making threats that he would return and have revenge on Robinson. How he kept his word is sufficiently apparent by the above. Lennon is still at large, while the recovery of the wounded man is considered extremely doubtful. The would-be murderer is of a yellow complexion, about 5 feet 5 inches in height and heavy set. It is thought likely that he has made his way to his old haunts in South Carolina.

Tax-Payers Meeting.

A large number of excessively burdened tax-payers from the county, came to the city last evening, to seek relief of their grievances, from the Board of County Commissioners. It is evident that a deep feeling of dissatisfaction at unfair and unequal assessments exists throughout the county and a determination to resist their collection, animates not a few alone, but hundreds upon hundreds. It culminated in a public meeting here, Owen Alderman, Esq., of Moore's Creek, was elected Chairman, and Bruce Williams, Esq., of Lillington, was appointed Secretary.

A regular organization was effected, embracing every township, to resist these intolerable oppressions. — A Committee on Resolutions reported through their Chairman, Dr. Satchwell, a series of resolutions which were unanimously adopted by this meeting of protest and indignation; at the unfair and unequal burdens of taxation imposed upon large numbers in each Township. The spirit and substance of the resolutions assert the inalienable right, traditional in Americans from the Revolution of 1776, to resist with all the rights and powers inherent in Americans, any re-inauguration in New Hanover of the oppressive system of unfairness and inequality of the present system of assessment of taxes, unequally sought to be saddled upon such large numbers in every Township.

These fundamental precepts of Constitutional liberty and human rights were unanimously and enthusiastically proclaimed, and it is evident that the county is literally on fire now with the same spirit. A committee was appointed to wait upon the Board of Commissioners, Dr. Satchwell as chairman, to ask for relief. A determination is manifest that the people, knowing their rights, dare maintain them.

The Board listened to the complaints through the resolutions adopted by the meeting. But we learn no satisfaction was given as to how these monstrous errors or blunders of assessment arose. The meeting of tax-payers adjourned to meet on next Saturday at Cedar Grove in Lincoln Township to hear the report of the Committee, and to take further action to secure their inherent and inalienable rights. The excitement is extensive and unabated.
