Closing Bar Rooms. MAYOR'S OFFICE. CITY OF WILMINGTON, N. C. THURSDAY, THE DAY OF AUGUST, being the time set apart for holding a PUBLIC ELECTION, it is ORDERED, That all Bar Rooms, or places where liquors are retailed, within the city limits, or within one mile thereof, be closed and remain closed from 6 o'clock THURSDAY MORNING, the 7th inst., until 6 o'clock on the morning of FRIDAY the 8th inst., in accordance with an Act of the General Assembly, passed the 18th day of August, 1868, which makes the selling or giving away of liquor upon a Public Election Day a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of not less than one hundred dollars, nor more than one thousand dollars.
