

ENGLAND.

Important changes in the Ministry - The Tichborne Troubles and Claimants.

New York, Aug. 8. Whalley, a member of the British Parliament, who arrived in this city on Wednesday, told a reporter yesterday that he came to obtain testimony favorable to a claimant to the Tichborne estate. He says a man appeared in England about three weeks ago who pretended to have been the steward on board the Osprey which picked up a boat from the wreck of the Belles, containing the claimant. He gave evidence of speaking the truth and corroborated important testimony already given on the trial. He thought it advisable to come over and see if he could find corroborative proof.

A gigantic swindle has been brought to light in the preparation for sale of over nine thousand chests of damaged tea. The tea is part of the cargo of the steamer Peterburg, wrecked off Bermuda. The parties who bought the damaged tea at Government sale have been doctored and preparing for some time in the West Street Mill House to fortify it upon the market when a favorable opportunity offered. The attention of the Health Board has been directed to the matter.

A Herald special, dated London, August 7th, says a Cabinet Council was held on the 7th and that a discussion resulted in important changes in the present Ministry. The Marquis of Ripon and Childers and Buxton have resigned, the two first for private reasons. Mr. Gladstone, in addition to the Premiership, assumes the portfolio of the Exchequer, in lieu of Mr. Low, who assumes the home office. Mr. Bruce is to be made a Peer, and will succeed Lord Ripon as President of the Council. Mr. Barham Carter succeeds Mr. Buxton as Joint Secretary of the Treasury. Arthur Peel becomes a Liberal Whig. Other changes are expected in a few days. John Bright joins the Cabinet as Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster.

The Liberals lost the election to-day in East Staffordshire.

The doctored food of the coast of Ireland, it is feared, is from the wreck of the Alabama, from Glasgow Saturday. No survivors from any wreck are reported.

STRUGGLING CUBA.

The Diario de la Marina on the Situation - Another Expedition Fitting Out in New-York.

HAVANA, Aug. 8. The Diario de la Marina of to-day says it has received telegrams announcing a decree annulling the sequestration of the property of Cuban rebels, but that it will not pronounce the news as false, for fear of misleading the public. It cannot accept it without official confirmation. The Diario thinks it impossible that the Spanish government decrees the immediate return of their property to the rebels and rebel sympathizers. It says the rebels have used a great part of their resources in buying vessels and arms to carry on the war, and that on the return of their property, they will send out new expeditions and prolong the struggle. It thinks such action would be an absurdity, and show a want of reason and patriotic sentiment on the part of the government. The loyal people of Cuba are making heavy sacrifices to enable the government to sustain the expenses of the war, and it is a great outrage to take a million or more out of the treasury in this way.

The Cubans of this city are preparing for another expedition to land arms and ammunition on Cuban soil by the steamer "Virginius" and it is said this will be the largest attempted.

NEW YORK.

Miscellaneous News.

New York, Aug. 8. The crew of the steamship Class quarreled and one man was thrown overboard and drowned. The party committing the deed has been arrested.

The steamships May Clinton and General Seigel collided off the Battery and the latter sunk. No lives lost.

The Lt. Domingo, is lost, with all hands.

The captain died of yellow fever.

ELECTRIC SPARKS.

In an Indian fight near Camp Verde, Cal., three Apaches were killed and five women captured.

Articles of agreement for a boat race have been drawn up and signed by Jno. A. Riglin, of New York, and George Brown, of Halifax, for \$4,000 a side. The race is to be rowed at Halifax on the 29th of August.

An excursionist to Atlantic City was drowned Thursday.

THE CHOLERA.

COLUMBUS, O., Aug. 8. Since July 6th there have been 24 cholera cases, 18 of which were fatal, outside of the Penitentiary. There have been six cases in the city, two of which are mild.

HOPKINSVILLE, Ky., Aug. 8. Three deaths from cholera in two days.

OUR NIGHT REPORTS.

WASHINGTON.

The Vienna Exposition Middle-The Manitoba Difficulties - Government Relations with Spain, &c.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8. The full report of the special Commission on the abuses of the United States branch of the Vienna Exposition has been received here. The conclusions are the reverse of complimentary to Gen. Van Buren and his confidential assistants.

CINCINNATI, August 8. The Government has received no official communications from Great Britain relative to the Manitoba difficulties and, therefore, contrary to report, has taken no action whatsoever in the premises. Not has the Government received any communications from the Spanish representatives concerning the action of the United States officers in relation to the protection of the Virginia.

The German Minister has been officially informed of the grounds of the conclusions of our part in the Vogt case and, further, that on the expiration of a certain time, Vogt will be discharged from custody. Husey, who was charged with the slaying of Slater by young Slater, of Alabama, is dead. Slater has not been arrested.

CONNECTICUT.

Terrible Struggle with a Mad Dog - Probable Fatal Result.

BRIDGPORT, Aug. 8. Patrick Hearty, a member of the Police force of this city, was severely bitten last evening by his own dog. The dog, which is supposed to have been mad, first attacked officer Jennings, who was in conversation with Hearty, but was beaten off by his club. He then flew at its master and seized him by the neck and neck and dogging him in a terrible manner. The dog was immediately shot dead. Hearty's condition is critical.

EUROPEAN NEWS.

Loss by the Burning of the Rice Mills in the Suburbs of London - Cable News - Ministerial Matters - Parisian News, &c.

LONDON, Aug. 8. The loss by the burning of the rice mills at Stipney was five millions. The whaling bark Annan, from Massachusetts, capsized. Five persons were lost and 17 saved by a passing vessel. Lady Trevilian is dead.

At a meeting yesterday of the directors of the company organized to lay a cable direct to the coast of New Hampshire, it was unanimously resolved to change the route and lead the cable on the coast of New Foundland.

The journals of this morning announce that Lord Frederick Charles Cavendish and Sir Arthur Wellesley Peet will assist Mr. Gladstone in administering the duties of the office of Chancellor of the Exchequer. It is also stated that Hon. Algernon Cecil has been offered one of the Junior Lordships of the Treasury. It is probable Sir John Duke Coleridge will be appointed Master of Rolls, Sir Leo Jessel Attorney General and Henry James Solicitor General.

PARIS, Aug. 8. The funeral of O'Dillon Patriot is to take place to-morrow. Mr. Thiers will be the pall bearer. On Monday M. Thiers will leave for Lucerne, where he will remain until the end of the week, when he will return to Paris.
