Fish and shrimps plentiful in market yesterday. The Brig Susac, Vest, arrived at London from this port on the 13th.

Upwards of one thousand barrels of spirits of turpentine changed hands in this city yesterday, the bulk of it at 40 cents per gallon.

At last accounts the body of Ephraim Hines, the colored boy drowned at Topsail Sound on Sunday last, had not been recovered.

Beverly Scott, who was to have been sent to the Work House, has been sick with typhoid fever and has been allowed to remain at home under proper security.

This city was visited by a heavy shower of rain last night, accompanied by heavy thunder and very brilliant lightning. The whole atmosphere seemed to be charged with electricity.

At a meeting of the Board of Directors on the 20th inst., the following resolution was adopted: Resolved, That a Committee to consist of President Roberts and W. J. Yates, be and is hereby appointed to confer with the citizens of Catawba county.
