WASHINGTON.

The September Report of Agriculture. WASHINGTON, Sept. 27.

The September report of agricul-ture indicates that the yield of maize will be somewhat lower than last year. The acreage also appears to be four per cent, less than in 1872, making a reduction of more than a million acres mostly in Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, nearly two-thirds of a million being in Illinois. The number of counties reporting an average condition in September is 222, above average 221, below average 581-total reporting 1,024. The general average of the condition, based upon county averages and the proportion of crop produced by each county is 81. The States averaging 100 or more are New Hampshire, New Jersey, Georgia, Alabama, West Virginia, Minnesota and Oregon. The averages of the great corn producing States are as follows: Kentucky 94, Ohio 91, Indiana 87, Illinois 68, Iowa, 81, Mis-

Minnesota in the West and New Jersey in the East report relatively and absolutely higher averages of condition. Maryland, Virginia and Florida present higher figures, and all other Southern States lower, than in 1872, though those upon the Atlantic coast promise an average crop. The yield of the Southwestern States was unusual last year, but will be considerably under average the present season, having suffered from too much rain in bottom lands. It is also a noticeable fact that in States where rains have been most injurious reports of local droughts are somewhat numerous. Complaints of low vitality from bad seed are common in Ohio and Michigan. Summer droughts were injurious in portions of some of; the States, and in Indiana, Illinois, lowa, Missouri and Kansas the crop is reported two weeks later thanusual. Injuries from chinch bug are reported in Indiana, Illinois, Missouri and Kansas. Grasshoppers proved destructive in sections of Wisconsis, Iowa and Kansas.

The Department of Agriculture is issning a circular for collecting the results of seasons experiencing a systematic warfare upon cotton insects. Attempts at protection against these pests have been more general and perf sistent than ever before. In many instances great success is claimed in the use of arsenical compounds. The circular says the annual losses in cotton from rayages of cotton insects amounts possibly to half a million of bales in years of "insect prevalence."

Any facts bearing upon this subject will be gladly received from plant ers who do not receive the circular of inquiry, as well as from correspondents and others who do.

Gould's, Views. A Times reporter wrang the fol-

lowing out of Jay Gould: "I think that the panic is over. I have every faith now in an advance

in prices, and believe that the market will be more buoyant than for a long time past. Wall street bas been alen! ed out of a great part of the worthless stocks and so-colled securities by the purging process of the panic, and there are comparatively few stocks now quoted except those of real value. In all cases, prices are now too low. and in that of good dividend-paying stocks a very large advance is necessary to bring them up to their actual worth. The reasons for an advance are that the money market will become easy as soon as the Stock Exchange is opened, owing to the very large quantities of greenbacks which have been disbursed by the Government, in its late bond purchases; that an immense amount of capital has been put into circulation by the action of the banks in issuing Clearing House certificates which displace a corresponding quantity of currency; that England, in sending over millions of gold, which will come into active use immediately on arrival, and that speculation has had such a long sleep that it will be all the more lively when it wakes up again. Mr. Gould said that the settlements of his house, as well as those of the other great stock concerns of Wall street, had been straightened up on Saturday, and that combinations, looking to an advance in prices, of an extensive character had been formed, which would be strong and complete enough to sustain the mar-ket in any event. So far as the Erie is concerned, Mr. Gould thought that it was about to be thrown overboard by Bischoffsheim, and that it will to be reorg through bankruptcy before it can ever be made to pay,

Grocery Trade and Shipping Interests A reporter of the Times called recently on Mr. Frank Thurber, of the well-known grocery firm of H. K. Thurber & Co., corner of Chambers and Greenwich streets, and asked for some information as to the probable effect on the grocery trade of the recent doings and undoings in Wall street. He said: "Even if the country banks all did suspend, the effect en our trade would be searcely no-ticeable. As a rule, business men, whether of large or small concerns, in one trade, use nearly all their money in their business. They rarely do so unbusiness like a thing as to lock up their money and leave it idle, or comparatively so, in a bank, while they can put it profitably to work. Their deposits in the banks are merely the proceeds of their sales and their profits from day to day, so that even if they were to lose that, they would only suffer the loss of a lvery small

portion of their general capital."

A number of the largest shipping firms in the city have been visited by representatives of the Thors, with the view of ascertaining the effect of the present commercial dead-lock on the shipping interests. Mr. G. A. Brett, President of the Ship owners. Association, stated that the difficulty experienced in selling exchanges had undoubtedly interfered with the freight trade, but could not state to when except. He could not say I that he had noticed any very material difference in his own business.
A representative of the firm of E. E. Morgan's Sons, stated that shipments had fallen off considerably during the past week, and freights had been reduced.
