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CHURCH MOVEMENTS.

The Old Catholics—Evangelical Alliance and the Episcopates. By foreign files received at New York on Saturday some particulars of the meeting of the Old Catholics Congress at Cologne a short time ago are at hand.

A resolution was adopted, on motion of Prof. Von Schlichte, which provides that in addition to the committee appointed by last year's Congress, with the object of opening negotiations with other religious communities with the aim of effecting a union of the churches, sub-committees shall be appointed competent to negotiate each separately with the separate churches, viz: The Anglicans, the Greeks, the Lutherans and others.

The Bishop of Maryland, in congratulating the Old Catholic Bishop, Mgr. Heintken, concluded his speech with these words: "Might I live, to sit side by side with him in council of brothers gathered to labor and pray and take sweet counsel together."
