OUR NIGHT REPORTS.

THE EVANGELICAL ALLIANCE.

Formal Opening in Steinway Hall,

New York-A Vast Crowd in Attendance-Rev. Dr. Woolsey, of New Maven, President-Addresses of Welcome, &c., &c. NEW YORK, Oct. 3. The Evangelical Conference opened with

prayer this morning at the Madison Square Church. The formal opening for business took place later in Steinway Hall. The vast hall was crowded to excess with delegates. They swarmed out on the lobbies and stairs at either end of the block through which the hall extends. The large platform was crowded so that as early as 10 o'clock there was hardly standing room. The Oriental delegates in white tartans were conspicuous objects in the vicinity of the chair. Hon. Wm. Dodge called the meeting to order and said: "You are here assembled from all parts

of the world, from countries having institutions and laws quite different from ours. As for us we seek no alliance with the State-we only ask protection and full enjoyment of religious liberty. (Great applause) We trust many of you will have opportunity of visiting our far Western lands and beyond our inland seas, and seeing the marvelous extension our country is undergoing. When we visit your countries we are deeply interested in looking over the works of centuries, your grand cathedrals and your cities of renown. When you come here we ask you to look at what has mainly been accomplished in a single century. The object of your meeting has been discussed for a long time and the country is alive to this convocation. Not only our own but other lands are viewing you with intense interest. The eyes of God and man are upon us. Let us hope that the blessing of God may be upon us. Everything possible has been done for your comfort. I give you as the sentiments of all our hearts a most cordial welcome to our country, our homes and our hearts. (Ap-

After singing a doxology a prayer was given by Rev. Dr. Hodge, of Princeton. Rev. Dr. Segg, of London, next read a portion of the seventeenth chapter of St. John, after which there was prayer by Rev. Matoe Prochet, of Italy, and was followed by the Dean of Canterberry with the creed. entire conference then rose and sang with once voice the evangelical hymn, Coronation. The business of effecting a permanent organization was then taken up and a list of officers read and adopted. Dr. Theodore D. Woolsey, of New Haven, was appointed President and Dr. S. J. Prime, General Secretary. Among the Vice Presidents were Wm. F. Havemeyer, Lord Alfred Churchill, of England, Hon. R. C. Winthrop, of Massacirusetts, Rev. A. Booner, Rev. Mr. Buckingham, of Connectivations of Massacirusetts. ticut, and Wm. E. Dodge, of New York. Rev. Dr. Schenck and others were appointed Honorary Secretaries.

The President, Dr. Woolsey, then took the chair amidst applause and delivered his address. He said: We are met here to-day because we believe in the communion of saints. (Applause.) We believe that man want, his need of redemption is one. (Applause.) And that God is one, and that in all the various unfoldings of the christian character and christian life there is one christian character, the spirit of love for God and love of man resting in Jesus Christ our Lord in the hope of redemption through Him. (Applause.) We believe in One Great Universal Church that has lasted through all time until now and is to last until the end of all things. (Applause.) Notwithstanding the inefficacy of prayer has been demonstrated by science (great laugh-

peat the welcome already given to you; yet, as your President, I may once more say to you that we welcome you all. It was then announced that it had been agreed upon that pastors should make their own arrangements with delegates as to services. Never, he says, was there a time more apt for attempting to check the spread of superstition, and he trusts all will cordially unite in doing so.

Rev. Mr. Prochet, of Italy, spoke on the condition of the Church in that country.— He said Pius IX. is conscious of diminished power. The clergy clung around the Holy See for support and all are eager to crush the common foe before them. All the Italian priests do not believe what the Pope taught, for only a few years ago 9,000 of them petitioned him to abandon temporal power, but he refused. For all that reformation is to be expected through the priests of Italy, for they are always ready to do the bidding of their master. The people, though Roman Catholic in name, are indifferent about their religion and instead of seeking out the truth, prefer to remain inactive in the Church in which they were born. He referred briefly to the various parties in Italy, and said there were over half a dozen-Protestant denominations who had each their churches and large congregations in that country. After paying a tribute to the ingenuity of the Jesuits, the speaker said Italy was divided into three parties, the Priests, the Protestants and the Infidels, and present indications showed that Evangelicals were making vast progress and would make more if they had sufficient

literature of their own. An autobiographical paper, by Professor A. Thulock, D. D., of Halle, Germany, was next read by Dr. Witte, of Koether, Prussia, the former having been too infirm to attend the Convention.

The hour for adjournment having arrived, it was announced that the Conference would reassemble at Association Hall at 2 o'clock this P. M., and remain in session until 5 o'clock. The evening meeting at the same place will begin at 7 o'clock. After a few additional notices, benediction was pro-nounced by Bishop Odell, of Ohio.

LONDON, Oct. 3. A chimney, 220 feet in height, in a village north of Fleet, fell to-day, instantly killing five persons and maiming a dozen others.

The Political Situation-Excitement in Paris.

U. S. TREASURY DEP'T, WASHINGTON,

Oct. 3, 1873. To Samuel Y. Tupper, Esq., President Chamber of Commerce, Charleston, S. C: SIR: I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of the memorial of the Charleston Chamber of Commerce, addressed to the President of the United States and referred to this department, which, after reciting the present stringency in the money market and difficulty of obtaining currency, requests that the sum of \$500,000 be placed and maintained on deposit with the Assistant Treasurer of Charleston, to be used by him in the purchase of New York Exchange in the purchase of New York Exchange

from the banks. To comply with the request it would be necessary for the Treasury Department to send currency by express to Charleston from time to time, and to buy with it e-x change on New York in competition with private banks. Should this request be granted, 100 other places in the country might, with equal propriety ask the same relief, and if all such requests be granted, the Department would find itself engaged in an extensive exchange business, fixing and regulating the rate of exchange be tween different places in the country, and the public funds, ordered by taxation only for the purpose of carrying on the government, would be employed to a very large amount in a business which Congress has not given the Secretary of the Treasury authority to engage in.

With due regard to the proper management of the Treasury Department within the provisions of law, I felt it to be my duty to decline all similar propositions from other places, and your request must therefore receive the same response. I have the honor to be, very respectfully WM. A. RICHARDSON,


