THE FINANCES.

The Currency Pressure—Encouraging Aspect of the Situation—A National Grain Bank. Notwithstanding the suspension of work in large manufacturing establishments, and commercial failures of houses of extensive connections, the financial condition, as viewed by the New York papers, presents a more encouraging aspect than recent events indicated.

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The New York Herald says: The only trouble seems to be about the currency—about the means whereby to transact business. Yet there has been no actual contraction—that is, the Government has not withdrawn any of the circulating medium.

The Tribune says: All authorities agree that currency is wanting. That alone is the panic needed for all our ills according to the unanimous vote of all the consulting physicians. The difficulty lay in putting entropy upon the market.
