## THE PINANCES.

The Currency Pressure Encourage ing Aspect of the Situation-A Na-

Notwithstanding the suspension of work in large manufacturing establishments, and commercial failures of houses of extensive connections, the financial condition, as viewed by the New York papers, presents a more encouraging aspect than recent events indicated. The stagnation in the circulating medium, growing out of a general want of confidence, as all know, is now the chief difficulty, and the New York papers of Monday particularly comment on this phase of the situation. The Times says:

The money in circulation was too little to hold up stocks, pay for the enormous crops of grain and cotton, and move them to the seaboard. The pause then began on account of the stringency in money, which was not artificial, but brought about in the ordinary course of events. Confidence has been shaken now by the numerous failures and the clatter concerning the instability of the moneyed institutions. A restoration of public confidence in the safety of the banks and an ample supply of money will bring about speedy recovery. As panic began on account of monetary stringency so it will end by relaxation in the rates of interest and proofs furnished that this will be permanent. We have the money now. There is more in circulation by \$50,000,000 than six weeks ago. The banks have drawn largely on their legal reserve. The Government has paid out the surplus of \$15,000,000 in purchases of bonds, and has also drawn largely upon the \$44,000,000 reserve. Millions of gold have been sent over from the Bank of England, which are now in active use here. The country needed more money, and it has been obtained. The truth is that before long currency will be a glut, and four per cent. be considered a high rate of interest. - Every manufactory that closes and every iron forge that shuts down, instead of adding to the general stringency in money, tends to make it more easy. Money is dearest when there is the greatest call for it to use in business requirements. It is cheap when it seeks investment instead of being sought for.

The New York Herald says:

The only trouble seems to be about the currency-about the means wherewith to transact business. Yet there has been no actual contraction—that is, the Government has not withdrawn any of the circulating medium. On the contrary, it has rather enlarged it by an extra issue of greenbacks and through increasing the fractional currency by the new silver coilage and issue. The increase of gold through importation within the last few weeks to the amount of ten millions has also cept a few bundles of hogshead and barrel augmented our resources for trade. There is, then, more currency than before the crisis, and when everything was going on swimmingly. The question is, therefore, will this currency be affoat again as the crisis passes away? Let the banks unlock their coffers and the people empty their stockings, and all will be well.

The difficulty lay in putting currency upon the market.
