The Panic Over. [The Nation.]

It may be worth while, in view of the present unsettled condition of the public mind, to call attention to the fact that a panic once in ten years, or twenty, is really all that a country is fairly entitled to, and that the present effort on the part of some enterprising now over, and the depression of business which has ensued is nothing more than what inevitably follows on the track of all panics. The condi-tion of the banks shows that the panic proper is over, as they have already resumed currency payments, and have in their vaults a supply of greenbacks three or four times as large as it was on the 20th of September, and a supply, too, which is constant. ly increasing.

Dry Goods,

How we are lessening in our foreign dry goods import is shown by the returns for the port of New York. At the same time our export of products indispensable to Europe is largely increased. The dry goods imports at New York the past month foot up \$8,836,012, showing a decrease as compared with the same months last year of about five hundred thousand dollars. The amount of goods thrown upon the market shows a decrease of \$3,000,000 as compared with October, 1878, and about \$1,500,000 less than in 1871. For the past ten months the total importations were \$107,110,195, against \$127,401,996, for the corresponding period last year, and \$118,537,431 in 1871. These figures are a good indication.
