[Condensed from the Sentinel.] SIXTH DAY. SENATE.

SATURDAY, Nov. 22. At the request of the Senate the Attorney General gave his written opinion that the Treasurer was not enoined from paying demands on the Treasury.

At 124 P. M., the special order, Mr. Merrimon's bill to be entitled "An Act in relation to the duties of the Public Treasurer" was considered, the question being on the second reading of the bill.

Mr. Norwood offered a resolution a substitute, to the effect that no injunction existed, that the Treasurer is required to pay the lawful demands made upon the Treasury, and that in doing so he would be si General Assembly.

The preamble of his bill, Mr. Mermimon said, set forth two facts-first, that the Treasurer had refused and on Treasury, and, secondly, that no injunction existed restraining him from doing so; and Mr. Merrimon proceeded to show these allegations to be true. He then discussed the provisions of his bill, which were, simply to compel him to perform his duty under the proscribed penalties.

Mr. Flemming offered a bill as an amendment to the amendment of Mr. Norwood. This bill required the Treasurer to pay lawful demands upon the Treasury under the laws of the State, without regard to the order of any Judge, State or Federal, under pain of impeachment.

Mr. Seymour repeated his objections of Friday, citing various learned authorities.

Mr. Flemming concurred fully in the views of Mr. Merrimon in regard to the order of Judge Boud, and joined him in a demand for immeate action. Still he preferred his own bill, as that of Mr. Merrimon might lead to numerous suits.

Mr. Welch did not think the honor and dignity of the State required hasty action. The question was one of a legal character to be settled by the court. There was no immediate danger threatening the State.

Mr. Norwood desired that no justice should be done between a high officer of the State and the people. The State had surrounded the officer with an array of eminent legal talent whose advice he was acting under; and whether they were mistaken or not, the officer should not be subjected to severe pains and penalties for acting under their instructions.

Mr. Dunham was in favor of immediate action. The Self suit was but the beginning of a long line of suits of a like character. The State should not be left at the mercy of merciless suitors.

Mr. Morehead, of Guilford, fully concurred with Mr. Dunham. Harris, colored, desired the whole matter referred to the committee on the Self suit. Mr. Merriman opposed the ref-erence, and so did Mr. Love. Mr. Murphy asked if this was an appellate case, and was told by Mr. Flemming that it was in two contingencies—the case of the imprisonment of the Treasurer and a writ of habeas corpus, or in the event of a disagree-

ment of the circuit court judges. The amendments of Messrs. Flemming and Norwood were rejected. The original bill of Mr. Merrimon then passed its second reading by a
