Deserters from Fort Johnson.—One of them arrested. The city authorities were notified yesterday, by Capt. A. M. Pennington, 2d Artillery, commanding the post at Smithville, that four soldiers named Clifford, Kelley, O'Brien and McGuire had deserted from Fort Johnson and had probably made their way to this city. A soldier was subsequently arrested on the street for drunkenness and was identified by the description given as O'Brien, one of the missing warriors. He at first gave his name as Capt. Fitzgerald, as McBride, and said he came here in a schooner from Baltimore. Upon being informed that no schooner had arrived here recently from that city, he said he had made a mistake, it was a steamer he came on. Upon being questioned, however, he could not give the name of the steamer. Afterwards, in the Guard House, he admitted to Sergeant McKenzie, of the police force, that he belonged to the garrison at Fort Johnson, but that he was absent on a "pass." He will be held for a requisition from the commander of the post.

Attempted Robbery. On Sunday night, about 10 o'clock, Mr. Dew, private watchman for Mr. F. W. Kerchner, discovered some one trying to effect an entrance at the rear of his establishment. When the thief found that he had been detected in the act he hastily escaped into the marble yard adjoining and made his way to Front street. Three shots were fired at him as he retreated, but none of them are believed to have taken effect. Sergeant Kuhl, of the police force, arrested on the ground about the time of the discovery of the attempted robbery, but too late to effect the capture of the thief. In his hurried retreat, the thief left a bag behind, which may lead to his detection.
