Concerning Bridges over Wilmington and Weldon Rail Road in the City of Wilmington, N. C.

WHERRAS, THE "CUT" MADE BY THE
Wilmington and Weldon Rail Boad Company
in the construction of their Rail Road, where the
same crosses or intersects the streets in the city
greatly impedes the passage of travellers and
tends to the manifest injury of the citizens.

AND, WHERRAS, The Board of Aldermen are
advised that it is the duty of the said Wilmington
and Weldon Rail Road Company to erect and maintain bridges across such cuts where the same cross
or intersect the streets in the city, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN, That in their opinion the public necessity demands the erection of bridges at the following
points where the said Rail Road intersects the following streets, to-wit: Second Street, Third Street,
Fifth Street, Sixth Street, Seventh street and MacRae Street. of Wilmington, N. C. .

Fifth Street, Sixth Street, Seventh street and MacRae Street.

RESOLVED, That in the opinion of this Board, the width of the bridges over said Railroad cut or excavation on Second Street should be thirty feet wide, on Third Street forty feet wide, on Fifth Street forty feet wide, on Sixth Street Twenty-five feet wide, on Seventh street, twenty feet wide, on McRae street twenty feet wide.

RESOLVED, That in the opinion of this Board, the Bridge known as Boney Bridge, where the Rail Boad crosses Fourth street, is so narrow as to impode the passage of travellers on the same, and that a bridge of fifty feet wide would be necessary to accommodate the public at that point.
