Reputed. At a mass meeting of colored men which assembled in front of the Market House last night, and which was addressed by Duncan Holmes, W. H. Moore, R. H. Leake and others, the following preamble and resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, we the citizens of Wilmington and constituents of Hons. G. L. Mabson and James Heaton, have learned through the published accounts of the proceedings of the General Assembly, of the action of these gentlemen relative to the repeal of such portion of the charter of the city of Wilmington as to the election of Mayor and Aldermen...

Resolved, That we denounce the course pursued by these representatives, and that we consider them as unworthy of the confidence of those whose suffrages elevated them to their present position...

Resolved, That the people of this county have lost confidence in George L. Mabson and several other colored men and the carpet-bag fraternity in general...

Resolved, That we do not recognize them as our leaders any longer, and that we have more confidence in the honest Democrats than in the sneaking Yankees who came here to prey upon the people and do so over our backs.

Resolved, That we have no further party relations with them, but paddle our own canoe.
