The Late Homicide Near Abbottsburg. A friend writing us from Abbottsburg gives the following version of the homicide near that place, the main particulars of which appeared in our paper Sunday morning. He says: "On Friday night or early Saturday morning was perpetrated one of the most brutal, unprovoked murders that has shocked this community in a long period. Thomas Thompson, a keeper of a bar situated one mile from Abbottsburg on the Elizabethtown road, was found dead lying prone with his skull fractured and an axe lying by his head, covered with blood and hair. The room presented no evidences of a struggle. The victim was evidently killed while looking in his money drawer for change. Circumstances fastened suspicion on three colored men, John Hall, Mitchell Shipman and Bill Wright. Sunday morning Mr. Thomas H. Sutton, having been called to conduct the examination, the inquest began and is being continued at the date of this communication. It is determined to give the matter a thorough and searching examination."

The New County of Jefferson. The Senate Committee on Propositions and Grievances have reported favorably upon the bill for the new county. The friends of the measure claim that it is gaining in popularity in the Legislature, as well as at home here in New Hanover, and think that the probabilities are in favor of a new county. The Board of County Commissioners, while feeling a delicacy in signing the petition officially, are, we learn, in favor of the measure as citizens. The Chairman, we are informed, so declares to its friends, as also that the citizens of Wilmington generally favor the proposition. As for ourselves, while we have no decided convictions either for or against the proposition, vet if our friends wish a new county, we would prefer that they take all the Townships except the Township of Wilmington.

ARREST OF DESERTERS.

Discovery of Their Rendezvous-How the Sailors are Imposed on, &c. Two deserters from the German Barque Claudia, Capt. Dintce, were arrested on the streets yesterday, by Sergeant Robert Mc-Kenzie, of the police force, and lodged in the Guard House for safe-keeping. Officers Faaberg and Messrs. O'Brien and Sellars also arrested a deserter from the Norwegian Brig Miletus. At the corner of Third ond Brunswick streets he broke from his captors and ran, when a lively chase ensued, which finally resulted in his recapture in the neghborhood of the Brooklyn Market, when he was safely lodged in jail.

Officer Faaborg has had warrants for number of deserters for several days past and has had his detective machinery at work with the view of ascertaining their whereabonts. Yesterday afternoon, acting upon information he had received, and accompanied by Mr. J. J. O'Brien, Officer W. H. Howe, and three others, he went across Hilton bridge and followed the railway to a point where the county road crosses the track, then took the right hand road about three quarters of a mile, when they discovered a hut, close to the margin of the river, constructed of poles and covered with pine straw and dirt. This hut was surrounded with bushes and briars which nearly concealed it from view and rendered it almost unapproachable. As the party approached the hut six men darted out and fied with all possible speed, through briars and brush, closely pursued by the officers. Two of the six were finally captured, after much difficulty, but the others escaped. From them it was ascertained that the two men captured in the city yesterday morning had returned on account of hunger, intending to get some provisions and then go back. The two captured at the hut belong to the German Barque Sophia Gorbitz] and were identified by Capt. Gorbitz, of that vessel, when they

were brought to the city. There are parties engaged in enticing sailors from their vessels, seizing their clothing under some frivolous pretext and running them out to this hut, where they remain until their vessel leaves the port, when they are shipped on some other vessel and their abductors get the advance money. At least this is the charge against them. We learn that the shanty where these men were kept was guiltless of any sign of furniture or sleeping accommodations. The two men captured were almost perished with hunger and cried like children, begging their captors to return them to their vessels for duty. They had been in the hut since Thursday night last.
