BRIBERY AND PRAUD.

Another Statesman Accused of Purchasing His Seat in the Senate-Serious Charges Against Spencer of Ala-

WASHINGTON, Dec. 25. The Committee on Privileges and Elections of the Senate will, upon the reassembling of Congress, take up the case of the contested Senatorship from Alabama. At the special session of the Senate last spring the prima facie right to the seat was decided to be with Spencer, but notice of intention to contest was served on the incumbent by Mr. Sykes. Since that time the contestant has been engaged in working up his case against pencer, and his friends triumphantly claim that he has abundant evidence to prove that Spencer obtained

his election by open fraud and bribery. Among other things it will be shown that Spencer induced internal revenue collectors and postmasters to furnish large sums of money to assist him in buying votes, and that he protected these officials from prosecution when they were discovered to be defaulters to the Government. In one case he obtained \$2,500 and in another \$12,000 from officials, when these men were arrested by the United States detectives and large defalcations discovered Spencer's notes of hand were found representing cash. The revelations promised by a thorough inquiry in Spencer's case will, it is said, be very startling.

MRS. VAN COTT.

The Female Bevivalist. [San Francisco Chronicle.]

Mrs. Van Cott is a lady of commanding presence, and a great degree of personal magnetism. She is a widow, about 44 years of age, and has been a local preacher in the Methodist Conference for eight years past, during which she has been roaming about the country holding revival meetings with great success. She has a very strong voice, which she often uses to its fullest capacity. She gesticulates freely, walks back and forth in the pulpit while delivering her discourses and smites the desk with her clenched hand as vigorously as the most demonstrative of the male members of the cloth. She has a highly dramatic manner, and says she has often been falsely accused of having been an actress. She has a good command of language, never appearing at a loss for a word, and is very impassioned in her appeals to the unconverted. She has a strong physique and a power of endurance surpassing that of any minister in the city. She vesterday discoursed from the pulpit four times, nearly an hour each time, led all the singing, prayed with great vehemence, and was thickest in the fray leading her hosts to combat with sin and Satan. An anonymous writer in your paper of the 24th, who signs himself "Robeson," and whose real name is Murdoch McRae, (as I found by demanding his name of you) has made a most unjustifiable assault on me, which forces me reluctantly into print. I am alluded to as "a prominent commission merchant of Wilmington" in Col. McRae's communication, and although my name is not mentioned it is well-known that I am the person referred to. The complaint against me is that I nominated the widow of the notorious cut-throat and outlaw. Henry Berry Lowery, as a Vice President of the Cape Fear Agricultural Association, at a late meeting of that body, and the inference is made that I intended to insult the good people of Robeson county thereby, and the gallant Colonel who favors you with his fiery manifesto proceeds to explain how his "Scotch blood" immediately underwent a "boiling" process on the strength of

the alleged nomination.

Before making a statement of the facts let me say that I think they will show that the gallant Colonel "boils" unnecessarily, and that if his "Scotch blood" is so easily heated his life must be miserable

In the first place "Mrs. H. B. Lowery' was not nominated or voted for by any one.
