NEW YORK.

The Bricklayers National Convention-Wholesome Recommendations-Strikes and Liquor Repudiated-Economy Recommended.

NEW YORK, Jan. 16. The National Bricklayer's Convention has adopted the following:

WHEREAS, In consequence of dullness of work, as stated by all local unions represented here, and the prospects for work

in the Spring are bad; therefore, Resolved, That the National Union of Brickhayers do recommend to the bricklayers of America that they hold firm to their local unions, avoid strikes by all means possible, and do your best to assist your brother workmen whenever found in distress.

And we also recommend to the bricklay-ers of America economy in all things possi-ble, and to avoid the use of liquor, as that is the curse of workingmen.

The Convention then adjourned sine die. to meet at Louisville, Ky., on the second Monday in January, 1875. Only four of the British subjects who

One of the communists is aged 15, and others of those arrested, say they are neither communists nor in sympathy with them, and had no intention of rioting when attacked by the police.

In the late attack on Amapola by the San Salvador force, forty of attacking party and seven of the defenders were killed, with many wounded on both sides. Hostilities have thus been commenced between Honduras and San Salvador.

There was a fire this morning in the Hamilton building, in Court street, opposite City Hall. The estimated loss is seventy-five thousand dollars.
