New York Trade.

The foreign import trade at New York for February amounted to \$35,-439,638. This total is about three millions smaller than the totals for either of the corresponding months in 1873 and 1872, and about the same as February, 1871. The foreign exports from New York for February last were \$20,725,611-about a half million less then February, 1873, but much larger than the figures for any previous February. On March 1 eight months of the current fiscal year had expired, the New York foreign trade returns for that period being \$243,-268,171 imports and \$231,420,520 exports. Compared with the corres- ult. ponding period of 1872-'3, this is a decrease of over thirty-two millions imports, but an increase of over fourteen millions exports. The customs duties collected at New York during the eight months have been \$73,763,-868-a decrease of fourteen millions compared with the corresponding period last year. The imports at New York usually amount to twothirds of those of the entire country, and the exports of forty-six per cent.
