SUNDAY DISPATCHES.

Supreme Lodge of Knights of Pythias - A New Constitution Adopted - The Louisiana Relief Fund - Conviction of a Wife Killer - Ocean Steamers between Charleston and England.

PITTSBURG, April 26. The Supreme Lodge of the world of Knights of Pythias adopted a new Constitution. It meets next year in Baltimore.

NEW ORLEANS, April 26. There are thirty thousand dollars in bank to the credit of the relief fund, but the calamity will require aid from every quarter.

WELLAND, ON., April 23. Michael Finn, charged with assaulting his wife with intent to kill, was found guilty of murder in the first degree.

CINCINNATI, April 26. The Chamber of Commerce heard J. Adger Smythe, Commissioner of Charleston (S. C.) Board of Trade in behalf of a line of Ocean steamers between that city and England, and passed resolutions promising moral support to the enterprise.

NOON REPORTS.

LOUISIANA.

The River at New Orleans Falling - Advice from Monroe - The People Moving into the Town - Heavy Loss of Stock, &c.

NEW ORLEANS, April 27. The river is falling and is now two feet below high water. From 5 to 7 days mail are due from Northern, Eastern and Western cities.

MONROE, April 27. The river rose quarter of an inch last night, and the back water an inch and a half. Washington street is flooded within three blocks of the river. The river is at a stand today, and the weather is fair and warm.

The Railroad Company has surrendered the mail contract between here and Vicksburg, and the telegraph is now the only source of correspondence.

MONROE, April 27. At this point the water rises and people continue coming in from the rear as water approaches. The sidewalks and streets are only pastures for stock. The loss of cattle and hogs by the overflow is very great.

The sun shone all day and there is a prospect of better weather.

NEW YORK.

Rev. W. T. Sabine - His Intended Resignation from the Ministry of the Protestant Episcopal Church - The Storm of Sunday.

NEW YORK, April 27. Rev. W. T. Sabine, Rector of the Church of the Atonement, whose refusal to bury George Holland, the actor from his Church called forth much criticism several years ago, announced yesterday that he intended to resign from the ministry of the Protestant Episcopal Church, and then gave in a sermon the grounds for this action and for his preference for the Reformed Episcopal Church.

POUGHKEEPSIE, April 27. Trains were delayed by the storm of Sunday, and the snow is said to be four feet deep in the cuts of the road.

CABLE DISPATCHES.

Examination of the Erie Railroad Books - Visit of the Czar to England - Castelar Favors a Federal Republic.

LONDON, April 27. Experts to examine the Erie railroad books will sail Wednesday.

Alexis is the only member of the Imperial family who accompanies the Czar to England.

Castelar declares in favor of a Federal Republic.

MISSOURI.

Reported Heavy Shipment of Arms and Provisions to Arkansas - The Operation a Secret One.

ST. LOUIS, April 26. The Times asserts that 2,000 Springfield rifles and thirteen thousand rounds of ammunition, and several cases of pistols, have been shipped in secret for Brooks' forces in Arkansas. It is also said that five car loads of provisions have been shipped to the same parties.

VERMONT.

Heavy Gale - A Church Steeple Demolished - Heavy Drift of Snow.

RUTLAND, Vt., April 27. A gale at Bennington demolished a steeple 160 feet high on the Congregational church. A part of the falling steeple struck an adjoining residence, crushing the roof.

Snow drifted ten feet deep to-day in consequence of a furious gale which raged.

ELECTRIC SPARKS.

At Lewes, Delaware, a severe gale prevailed Sunday, and the houses were foundered, but no loss of life is reported.

In Congress, Monday, in the House it was bill day, and the Senate occupied the day with summer eulogies.

The Chattahoochee river has overflowed the entire length and done considerable damage in Georgia and Alabama.

The steamer Exporter left Louisville, Ky., Saturday afternoon, with seventy-five tons of government rations for the Louisiana sufferers.

OUR NIGHT REPORTS.

WASHINGTON.

The Arkansas Dilemma - Gov. Baxter and Martial Law - Delays in Congress.

WASHINGTON, April 27. The following has been received from Little Rock, Arkansas:

To the President: It is not true that I had declared martial law outside of Pulaski county. Nothing has been done by my party to prevent a peaceable settlement by the Legislature. I only want to protect myself until that is done.

Both Houses are eulogizing Sumner. Reports are in circulation to-day that the Freedman's Savings Bank had closed its doors, but they were unfounded. During the forenoon a few depositors called at the bank with check books for the purpose of closing accounts by withdrawing their deposits, but fearing a run on the institution

the management applied the rule in their charter which authorized the bank to require 60 days' notice previous to the withdrawal of deposits. Depositors requiring money for current business purposes were accommodated.

The Signal Office reports that the Mississippi river has risen slightly during the past 24 hours throughout its entire course, from the strait to New Orleans.

The rise at the latter place is, however, only two inches, while the greatest rise at Dubuque, only standing inches.

The Missouri has fallen steadily from Tankton to Booneville and risen slightly there to its mouth.

The Ohio has risen four inches at Patsburg, below which city it has fallen to its mouth.

The Red River has risen four inches at Shreveport, while the Alleghany, Cumberland, Potomac and Monongahela have fallen, the latter rapidly.

ALABAMA.

The Flood in the Alabama River - Great Damage to the Plantations - Destruction of Crops.

SELMA, April 27. The Alabama river is two feet above the high-water mark of July, 1873, and is still rising slowly. The water lacks two inches of being in the press room of the Daily Times building, which stands six feet above low water. The river lands south of Selma are submerged. Great damage has been done to plantations by destruction of the crops. The oldest inhabitants never saw three overflows in six weeks.

MONTGOMERY, April 27. The Alabama river is very high, but there is no break in the railroad connections. All are running on time, making close connections.

The memorial celebration to-day was very imposing. An immense procession moved to the cemetery, and flowers were strewn over the graves. Business was suspended from 3 o'clock until night.

WEATHER REPORT.

Office of Chief Signal Officer, Washington, April 27 - 6:35 P. M. Probabilities.

For the Middle States and lower lake region, increasing northeast to southeast winds, cloudy weather and rain except over the latter and northern New York partly assnow.

For the South Atlantic and Gulf States East of the Mississippi, southerly to westerly winds, increasing cloudiness and possible rain, especially over the interior.

For Tennessee and the lower Ohio Valley, winds shifting to West and North with clearing weather.

The Ohio river from Marietta to Evansville will rise, and below Evansville continue falling, but the Mississippi below St. Louis will remain nearly stationary.

PANAMA.

A Question of National Dignity - Advice in the Gold Rate.

PANAMA, April 27. The circumstance of the disembarkation of the United States forces during the revolution in Panama, is giving rise to considerable discussion at Bogota as an offense to the national dignity of the United States.

Gold is seven per cent. premium in consequence of the Panama railroad company requiring all settlements for freight to be paid in that coin.

GEORGIA.

The Confederate Memorial Exercises at Atlanta - Eloquent Address of Col. Hardeman.

ATLANTA, April 27. The memorial exercises to-day were attended by ten or twelve thousand people. The procession was near a mile long. The speech of Col. Thomas Hardeman was eloquent and made a fine impression. The graves were beautifully and bountifully decorated.

ILLINOIS.

Sentence of Dr. Paul Scheppe at Chicago - Relief for Mississippi River Sufferers.

CHICAGO, April 27. In the Criminal Court of this city, Judge Gary sentenced Paul Scheppe, convicted of forgery, to three years in the penitentiary.

The Exchange has appointed a committee to solicit contributions for the Mississippi river sufferers.
