The last estimate places the aggregate shipments at 800,000 baskets growers at Dover. The manner of gathering their data for their estimate was different from that of the peach growers. It was prepared by the agents at the several stations along 358,000 baskets in excess of that of the late convention of the peach agents at the several stations along the railroads, under instructions after a thorough canvass among the growers, ond is more likely to be correct than the unsystematic way in which the estimates are arrived at in a convention of the growers. The latter, for instance, do not take into consideration the smaller orchards when making up their estimates, but base their calculations solely upon those of forty, fifty and sixty acres in extent. The railroad agents include all, and thus get nearer the actual shipments each year.

DESTROYING VERMIN ON PLANTS. [Fruit Recorder.]

I saved my egg plants from the Jumping Jack or flea, by dusting the plants with lime and Paris green, dusting them while wet. The Colorado beetle was determined to take sprinkled on them, saved them. The old, black potato bug eat most of my gladiolus, dahlias and sunflowers, till then they left or died. The same application would not disturb the squash bug nor the striped cabbage worm. but soon moved the striped cucumber bug. I destroy most kinds of bugs and beetles by making fires from old trash, burned just at dark, when they come to the light and perish in the force his rights according to his own con-fire. I prepare a bonfire every even-ing from old brush, weeds or stalks.

SAND AND WATER FOR CUTTINGS. The Revue Horticole recommends the following mode of striking the cuttings of soft wooded plants:

Take a flower pot saucer, fill it with river sand, and place the cutting in the same, having first saturated the whole with water. The sancers are put in a sunny place, and always kept full to the brim with water. Almost any kind of cutting will grow then.

CROP PROSPECTS. The promise for breadstuffs and cotton is exceedingly gratifying, while the hay crop will be enormous. In some of the Southern States ten per cent, more of acreage in corn has taken the place of ten per cent. less of cotton. The fruit crop is the sub ject of much discussion. Michigan's crop of peaches will be immense. New Jersey, it is believed, will send 600,000 bushels of peaches to market, and Delaware 500,000 of early Yorks, Troths and Hale's Early and St. George's Hundred. Delaware alone has 1,000,000 of healthy trees. Raspberries, currants and grapes all promise an abundant crop.

Russell on Civil Rights.

Opinion of Judge Russell in the Matter of the Late Theatrical Im-

It appears from the evidence that Pennypacker is the proprietor or tenant in possession of a certain public Theatre or opera House in the city of Wilmington; that defendants, having procured tickets, presented themselves at this Theatre, and attempted to get admission therein; that the when opened again for another public enter--tainment, and having formed and expressed a purpose to prevent them from entering the house, applied to the Mayor of the city for a nouse, applied to the Mayor of the city for a police force to suppress disturbance and protect him in his possession; and also instituted this judicial proceeding. That defendants did attempt to enter, after being forbidden by the prosecutor, and that they did present themselves for admittance in a manner that might well have been considered menacing and disorderly, seems to be established, by the evidence—that they established by the evidence:-that they cherished a purpose to repeat their attempt and to accomplish it by force, seems to have been honestly believed by the prose-cutor; and this belief is, I think, sustained by all the circumstances. From these facts it follows that the prosecutor was justified in suing out this process; and the question as to whether he had a right to exclude these parties is not to be considered .--No one is allowed to assert or enforce a mere civil right by resorting to violence .-If one has my property and wrongfully withholds it, I have no right to take it from him forcibly. If one wrongfully obtains possession of the house of another, the ownthem, but the Paris green in water er, although he have an absolute title and an unquestionable right of possession, must not violently seize the premises and forcibly eject the possessor. If he does he is answerable to the criminal law, and it gave them the Paris green and water; will be no defence for him to set up title in himself. Enough appeared in the examination of

these cases to show that in truth there was a controversy between these parties as to the right of the defendants, who are men of color, to accom-modations and privileges in this theatre equal to those enjoyed by other persons. Assuming that this house is a place of entertainment for the general public, that it is licensed by the laws of the State, and that there is nothing in its objects or character which relieves it from those legal rules which apply to the government of all insti-tutions in which the public has an interest and which are established or permitted for the public good—as to all of which there was no evidence and hence I express no opinion—assuming that this is the fact, I apprehend that the right of these defendants to precisely the same accommodations and the same treatment as other persons, will not be questioned. The pretension that any person or class may be prevented from resorting to a public place whose doors are open to all but them and denied to them only on account of color or race, will not be tolerated by any Court honestly and sincerely desirous of expounding the Con-stitution and laws according to their true intent and meaning. It may be that the manager of this theatre has the right to separate different classes of persons whose close association is not agreeable to each other—always remembering that he must not discriminate against any; but that the accommodations given, the comfort, style, convenience and all other considerations for solicit the parties pay their money shall be the which the parties pay their money, shall be the same as to all, or so nearly so as to furnish no sub-stantial cause of complaint by any. This opens a wide field of argument into which I have not the time to enter. The defendants, by adopting unlawful means of asserting what they believed to be a right, have rendered themselves amendable to this proceeding. If it was their purpose to test a legal right, they ought to have kept inside of the law—not to have constituted themselves violators of the law, whose protection and assistance they were seeking. This much is said in reference to the rights of the parties lest the decision of this cause shall be misunderstood. A court is always sustained in giving expression to an obiter dictum when the purpose is simply to avoid a misconception of the extent or bearing of its decision. This opinion is formed almost without any opportunity for reflection, without any argument by counsel and without consulting a single authority. Hence I do not ask or exinine work—gentlemes, for more."

When informed that it was necessary to cut down his force the old and mature study always given to cases which are to be looked to as authority. I would not have put this opinion in writing but for the apprehension that the ruling would be misunderstood or misrepresented.

It is adjudged that the warrants be dismissed at the cost of the defendants. [In re-publishing the above opinion, we have italicized that portion to which we wish to call special attention.—Eds. Star.
