In your issue of the 12th inst., I see an account of the unfortunate homicide at Mullins', S. C., which was evidently given circumstances of the affair. Justice to the lamented dead demands that the incorrect statements and impressions therein contained be corrected through the same medium There was a pic-nic at Mullins' Depot on

the evening of the 8th inst., but Mr. D. P. Higgs, the unfortunate victim, had no counection whatever with it, nor did the picnic have anything to do with the fatal affray. The assault was entirely unprovoked on the part of young Higgs. He, in company with two young men, was spending the evening quietly at his place of business. Young Gilchrist, who was under the influence of liquor, came down to the depot and for no apparent cause began to curse Mr. H. in a manner so riotous and abusive that he was forced to resent it. The statement that young Higgs "had been drinking and walkd in to the store in front of which they had been standing to get another drink, after which he came out, walked up to Gilchrist and struck him a severe blow. knocking him down," is totally at varience with the true statement of the case-first, because Higgs was standing on his own piazza when attacked by Gilchrist; se-condly, because it can be proven by men of high moral character and veracity who transacted business with Higgs a few minutes before the affray, that there was no evidence or smell of liquor about the young man; and, thirdly, because Gilchrist was not knocked down at all, having received no blow severer than one stroke from Higgs' hand. In the commencement of the afiray Gilchrist was assisted by one Reamer, a telegraph operator from Marion. who dealt Higgs two severe blows with something in his hand on the back of his head, which stunned him, and after Reamer was taken off of Higgs and Higgs recovering himself form the ground, Gilchrist struck him one or more times with a piece of scantling two feet eight inches long and one and a quarter inches thick, which is supposed to have inflicted the fatal blow Mr. Higgs was seen to take one drink

after he had been so severely wounded. There was no intimacy existing between the parties for some time past, and both

young men were of age. Gilchrist never was arrested. He gave after the verdict of the coroner's jury.
