Escape of Insane Patients from the Poor House--Their Subsequent Capture and Confinement.

A few days since we mentioned the fact that the new building at the County Poor House, intended for the insane patients, was nearly completed. It is now finished and yesterday this class of the parishioners were to have been transferred from their old quarters to the new building prepared for their benefit. It appears that a colored man, well known about town as "Tinney," McIlhenny, and a colored youth about 21 or 22 years of age, by the name of Nathan Graham, got an inkling of the proposed transfer. Graham is very violent at times, and has to be kept closely confined in a cell as a means of protection to the other inmates of the institution, while old "Tinney" on the contrary, though considerably cracked, is nevertheless perfectly harmless, though easily persuaded; hence he was allowed the freedom of the main room in the building, without being placed under the restriction of lock and key. A Graham some how got the notion in his head that he would not like his new quarters, and prevailed upon "Tinney" to get a hatchet from the yard and liberate him and that the two would then make their escape. Accordingly, about 12 o'clock on Thursday night "Tinney" got the hatchet and finally succeeded in severing the link of the chain which was used in fastening the door of the cell in which Graham was confined, when the door was easily opened. The two then took their departure, Graham with a pair of handcuffs on his wrists which the Superintendent had found it expedient to call into requisition. He had sense enough, however, to take a blanket along which he wrapped around him in such a manner as to hide the ornaments. They started down the track of the W. & W. Railroad, but stopped at one of the first houses they came to and succeeded in accommodating themselves to a lot of eggs which they took from a nest in a chicken coop, with which they satisfied the cravings of their appetites, which had been whetted by their night's adventure. They then proceeded until they reached Union Depot, when they were suddenly brought to a halt by Mr. Whitey Bowden, the watchman. Upon being stopped Graham showed a disposition to resist and made an attempt, although handcuffed, to get hold of the hatchet which "Tinney" still carried in his hand, the latter in the meantime, with an idiotic grin, standing calmly and passively in the spot where he had been halted. In trying to get the hatchet the blanket fell from the shoulders of Graham, disclosing the handcuffs and revealing to Mr. Bowden something of the true character of the man before him. He thereupon took the hatchet from "Tinney" and told Graham if he resisted he would use it on him. This had the effect of cooling the ardor of the crazy youth and Mr. B. marched them both to the Guard House, where they were locked up.

The Board then adjourned.

The Great Falls Factory--Great Destruction of Property by the Storm and Flood.

In our issue of Wednesday we briefly alluded to the damage done to the Great Falls Factory, in Richmond county, by the recent storm. From an extra from the office of the Pee Dee Courier, whose editor visited the scene of the disaster, we learn that the basement room of the mills, containing about sixty bales of sheeting, looms, machinery, tools, &c., was partly filled with water, and there was much water on the second floor, caused by its dashing down the falls and over the rocks. The building was entirely surrounded by the running water. The washing away of the dirt and rock dam above, next to and north of the building, precipitated the water directly against the wheel-house carrying it away. The extent of the loss sustained by this sad occurrence cannot, until further developments, be correctly estimated. The actual loss, however, must be between seven and ten thousand dollars. Besides the damage above sustained great injury. At the Pee Dee Mills, on the Hitchcock, considerable injury has been done to the brick, brick kilns, and a large quantity of lime destroyed. Mr. A. Stewart lost about six thousand unfinished brick. Two trestles on the railroad over Falling Creek and the pond are wrecked, and the bridge at the depot is gone. Mr. Aycock has doubtless sustained serious damage at his factory--extent not known.

Johanna Robinson, a colored female representative of the chain-gang, arraigned on a charge of stealing 25 cents, the property of Martha Hill, had an additional thirty days placed to her account.

R., was completely overflowed by the late storm, and it is also reported that a man who was at work in the swamp at the time has not since been seen or heard of. We could not ascertain his name, or whether he was white or colored.

Wilson Advance: It will be recalled by our readers that one Unzell published last week as passing himself off as agent for the Raleigh News, when in fact he was a United States detective or spy. This detective hunted up his witnesses and pointed upon Mr. J. J. Taylor, of Manning Township, in Nash county, and carried him to Raleigh on the charge of distilling contrary to law and selling brandy without license. Mr. Taylor has taken exception to the charges and has secured a host of Radical lawyers to prosecute him upon the trumped up charges, and was detained several days in Raleigh to answer the charges which they preferred against him. But the case was too thin and the character of the witnesses too bad for these hawks to make a "good thing," and Commissioner Best discharged Mr. Taylor, who returned to his home to pursue his legitimate business.

Polkton Annonias: On Saturday night last, two of Moses' pet negroes from South Carolina, came to Laurel Hill on the Carolina Central, in Richmond county, and broke into the warehouse of Mr. Morrison and stole a quantity of goods. Mr. Morrison during the night awoke and went into his store and discovered that he had been robbed. He immediately "struck track" and reached the mill dam where he lost their track. He also broken into the house of a farmer, and stolen seven or eight gallons of brandy. Gathering a crowd he followed on until he reached a mill dam where he lost their track. The party concealed themselves, and soon the two rascals made their appearance. They were summoned to surrender, when they immediately fired on the party, some of the balls passing through the coat of one of the white men. The fire, of course, was promptly returned. One of the negroes was mortally wounded, and the other sufficiently wounded to place him horsed combat. All the stolen property was recovered and Governor Moses is minus two of his most ardent and faithful supporters.
