Proceedings of the Annual Meeting -The President's Report-Blection

The regular annual meeting of the Chamber of Commerce was held yesterday morning at 11:30 o'clock in the rooms of the STAR Job Printing Office. Commercial Exchange.

Col. W. L. DeRosset, the President of the Chamber, called the meeting to order and business was proceeded with.

The report of Richard W. Andrews, Secretary and Treasurer, showing the financial condition of the Chamber, its receipts and expenditures during the past year, together with the report of the Auditing Committee, were read.

Col. W. L. DeRosset, President, offered the following very interesting report, which, on motion, was ordered spread upon the minutes and also published:

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE, WILM SGTON, N. C., Oct. 6, 1874. To the Executive Committee of the Chamber of

GENTLEMEN: At the close of our fiscal year, a resume of the business of our port, and your efforts looking to the general improvement of the business facilities of our city and port would be desirable as a matter of record.

It is a gratifying fact, that, notwithstanding the general depression in trade, consequent upon the financial panic of 1873, the records show a satisfactory result in comparison with the business of the previous year; and our commercial community have, as a rule, passed through the trying ordeal with but slight losses.

The gradual reduction in values of most of the prime necessities of life, and the nearer approach to a healthy and safe business, as was formerly done in this section, are matters for congratulation on the part of our still suffering people; promising in the near future relief from some, at least, of the many curses under which they have patiently suffered.

The principal efforts of the Chamber during the past year, have been a continuation of their labors in behalf of the improvement of our bar and river.

The continued, very earnest and self-sacrificing labors of your indefatigable Chair man of the Committee on Bar and River Improvement, Mr. Henry Nutt, have resulted in securing from Congress, with the valuable assistance of our Senators and Representatives, an appropriation much in excess of what we could have expected, enabling a continuation of the work under the

general plans adopted.

The result so far has been fully up to expectation, and the fact of a vessel having passed through Bald Head channel drawing 15 feet 4 inches, is the best evidence of the benefits arising therefrom.
