Quarantine Notice. FROM AND AFTER THE FIRST OF JUNE 1874, the following Quarantine Regulations will All vessels from ports south of Cape Fearwill come to at the Visiting Station near Deep Water Point, and remain until inspected by the Quarantine Physician.

All vessels with sickness, or having had sickness aboard during the voyage, are required to come to the Station for inspection, regardless of the port from whence they came. Vessels not subject to such regulations will proceed to Wilmington without detention. Pilots are especially enjoined to make careful en-quiry, and if not satisfied with the statements of the Captain or person in command, or if the vessel is in a filthy condition, they will bring the vessel to the Station for further examination.

Pilots wilfully violating the Quarantine laws are subject to forfeiture of their branch; Masters of vessels to a fine of Two Hundred Dollars for every day they violate the Quarantine laws; and all other persons are liable for every offence. All vessels subject to visitation under these regu-lations will set a flag in the main rigging, port side.
