## NOON REPORTS.

## NEW YORK.

**Illness of Mrs. Titton—Proposition for the Settlement of Louisiana—Trotting—Prospect Park Race—Cotton—New York, Oct. 10.**

Mrs. Titton is sick and physicians say that anxiety has prostrated her entire system. In the meantime "there are flowers, carriages, laughter and applause."

The *New Orleans* special says that Kellogg having in his recent address signified his willingness to abide by the court of arbitration of 1872 by the Board of Arbitration, prominent Democrats have proposed that the returns now secreted by the order of the McEnery returning board be brought forward and canvassed anew with a view to the final settlement of contested election cases. In order to effect this arrangement it will be necessary for both parties, and the several candidates on each ticket, to agree to submit to the decision of the arbitrators. The proposition has not yet been formally submitted to Kellogg, but it is reason to believe he is well satisfied of his election by a large majority that he will agree to it, if the arbitration can be fairly conducted, and the Democrats give proper guarantees of sincerity and good faith.

At Prospect Park yesterday the sixth heat of the race for the 600 dollars purse, for 2:30 horses, was won by Lady White. May Bird took the second money and Black Crook the third—time 2:30.

The double-team trot purse for 500 dollars was won by Lady Woods and Carrie N. In the third straight heat bearing Ella Madson, and Hyman Hand Regulus—time 2:35, 2:40, 2:44.

In the race for the purse of \$1,000, for 2:20 horses, Comet won the second, third and fourth heats, Bella winning the first heat—time 2:20, 2:22, 2:23, 2:24.

The well-known trotting Ganner Boy, Thomas L., Young Arthur and Palmouth Boy have been severely injured by having cotton oil poured over their heads while competing at Prospect Park, the former being terribly blistered. The association offers \$500 reward for discovery of the perpetrator.

## ILLINOIS.

## Executive Council of the National Catholic Convention.

CHICAGO, Oct. 10.

The Executive Council of the National Catholic Convention received the following this morning:

"Roma, Oct. 9th.—The Sovereign Pontiff from his heart most lovingly grants the benediction asked for by you and all delegates of the Catholic Union for Total Abstinence." (Signed) "CARDINAL ANTONELLI."

An emigration department was ordered to be opened by the Union to aid emigrants in finding proper homes.

Rev. John Ireland, of St. Paul, Minn., reported the features of a plan for the purpose of inducing emigrants to emigrate through committees to be appointed in all seaboard cities and measures will be taken to keep emigrants from the demoralizing influence of indifference when they first land, and to send them speedily to safe homes.

After the transaction of considerable general business the Council adjourned to call on the President.

## ENGLAND.

## The Direct Cable—1,000 Miles of Cable Laid.

LONDON, Oct. 10.

A circular has been sent to the shareholders of the direct cable company, informing them that the management have decided to abandon about 30 miles of cable, which is now lying on a rocky bottom, and effect a splice at a more suitable point. The circular says that in all 1,100 miles of cable have been laid and satisfactory tests are obtained daily by electricians.

The minors of West Riding, Yorkshire, having refused to consent to a reduction of 20 per cent. in their wages, have been locked out to the number of six thousand.

## SPAIN.

## Capture of La Zuardia—Marines for Cuba.

MADRID, Oct. 10.

The Republican army under Gen. Laserna has crossed the Rio and taken La Zuardia. This success has made an excellent impression here. The Carlisle leader, with the bulk of his followers, is at Larioja di Navarra.

One thousand marines embark for Cuba November 9th.

## ELECTRIC SPARKS.

A London dispatch announces the death of the Duke of Leicester.

In the Baltimore circuit Court, at Towson, Tuesday morning, in the case of Sam'l McDonald, on trial for the murder of Berry Amos, the jury after being out since Friday afternoon, brought in a verdict of not guilty.

A telegram received at the Navy Department Saturday, from Capt. A. Semmes, commanding the Pensacola Navy Yard, says that the *Pensacola* is doing well. One more case of yellow fever is reported, and thirteen officers and men are convalescent. The fever is declining for want of subjects.

## TENNESSEE.

## A Negro Preacher on the Rampage—The way of Disposing of Him.

NASVILLE, Oct. 10.

Joe Sawyers, a negro preacher, was shot and killed near Franklin, Tenn., while attempting to enter the residence of an old man named Shy with the intention of murdering him and wife and burning the place. A negro detective, sent from Nashville to investigate a former attempt to burn Shy's house, suspected Sawyers and induced him to enter into the above arrangement and then apprised Shy.

## NEW YORK.

## The Episcopal Congress—A New Diocese—A New Canon Proposed, &c.

New York, Oct. 10.

In the Episcopal Congress the new diocese for New Jersey was ratified and many resolutions were adopted. Major Lewis, of Maryland, introduced, with a long preamble, the following resolution:

Resolved, The House of Bishops concurring, that the following canon of ritual uniformity be enacted:

Canon of Ritual Uniformity: Section 1. The elevation of the elements in the holy communion in such a manner as to expose them to the view of the people as the objects towards which adoration is to be made, in or after the prayer of consecration or in the act of administering, or in carrying them to or from the communicants, bowings, crossings, genuflections, prostrations, reverencies, bending down upon, kissing the Lord's table, and kneeling, except as allowed, provided for, or directed by rubric or canon, and any gesture, posture or act implying such adoration, any ceremony not prescribed as part of the order for the administration of the Lord's Supper, or holy communion, likewise the use of any administration of the holy communion of any hymn, psalm, collect, epistle or gospel other than those appointed in the authorized formula of the Church, are hereby forbidden.

Sec. 2. In all matters pertaining to the public worship of the Church, to the ornaments, arrangements and appointments of the holy table, and in everything connected with the ritual in the performance of divine services, the instructions or judgment of the Bishop of any diocese given in writing shall be regarded as binding, to be followed and obeyed by every minister of that diocese.

This was referred to the Committee on Canons. Several other resolutions and memorials from Virginia, relating to the same subject, were referred also to the same committee.

## WASHINGTON.

## Yellow Fever at Pensacola—Condition of the Sick—A New Prescription for the Nation's Sickness, &c.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10.

A telegram received at the Navy Department this evening from Capt. Semmes, commanding the Pensacola Navy Yard, says there are four sick, one of them in a new case previously reported, but very mild. Paymaster McMahon is doing well, but private McGowan is seriously ill. There are thirteen convalescents.

A letter addressed to the President by a prominent Conservative politician in Mississippi, argues that the only true way to restore the peace and prosperity of the South is for Congress to pass an act to pay for quartermaster and commissary stores taken by the Union army in the South during the war and to refund the cotton tax. It is then referred to the Attorney General by the President.

The new secret service corps report several important arrests of counterfeiters.

The S. M. Anderson of Texas reports that he has arrested and brought thirteen citizens of Montague county. The dispatch is dated at Denison, Texas.

Postmaster General Jewell telegraphs to the S. M. Anderson, Texas, and says thus: "It is my desire that no agent stand between this department and any party with whom it has business." "I cannot and will not tolerate claim agents."

## CONNECTICUT.

## The Ellen Lucas Mystery Partially Revealed.

BRIDGEPORT, CONN., Oct. 10.

The coroner's jury concluded an inquest on the body of Ellen Lucas, which was found in a small stream of water on the 3rd instant, and rendered a verdict that she "ceased to breathe at the hand of Jas. E. Latetino, who was seen with her prior to the murder, and who was arrested shortly after."

## ALABAMA.

## Appointment of United States Deputy Marshals for Election Purposes.

MONTGOMERY, Oct. 10.

Gen. R. W. Hays, United States Marshal for Alabama, has appointed some dozen or two deputy marshals, upon the recommendation and request of Charles E. Mayer, Chairman of the Republican Executive Committee of the State. These deputies have been appointed in the negro counties for election purposes exclusively, and are all republicans.
