NORTH CAROLINA METHODISTS. Proceedings of Conference of M. E. church, South, in Session at Raleigh.

D. C. Johnson—Character passed. Continued in supernatant relation.

B. T. Blake, the oldest member of the Conference, at the request of the Bishop, gave his religious experience, which was very happy and moved many to tears and sympathy and joy.

Dr. Cross expressed his high estimate of and warm affection for brother Blake, who was his Presiding Elder when he (Dr. C.) presided over the Conference.

Bro. Blake proceeded to give a very amusing account of his experience of those early years, especially of his awkwardness in baptizing by immersion; would raise the subject from the water with head pointing down stream—was satisfied he was not called to baptize, but to preach the gospel.

Bro. Blake sat down amid much laughter, which none enjoyed more than our Baptist friends.

Bro. Blake continues in supernatant relation. The characters of several old ministers passed and they were continued in the supernatant relation.

Dr. W. Mangum introduced a resolution touching the separation of Dr. Moran from the Conference.

Adopted. Dr. Moran expressed his great gratification and some surprise that the resolutions had been adopted with such unanimity.

The Bishop introduced Dr. J. B. McFerrin, our Missionary Secretary, to the Conference.

Dr. McFerrin addressed the Conference, representing the interests, first of the Nashville Publishing House—called attention to the General Minutes, the Proceedings of the General Conference, the Nashville Christian Advocate, the Sunday School Publications, the Quarterly Review—would press address the Conference on the publishing interests again when the report of the Committee on Books and Periodicals should come in. Also on the subject of Missions.

J. H. Wheeler, from the committee on the appeal of John Bule from the Cumberland Circuit, handed in his report, affirming the proceedings of the Quarterly Conference, expelling the Rev. John Bule from the Methodist Church.

Where shall the next Annual Conference be held? W. S. Black nominated Wilmington. N. H. D. Wilson nominated Greensboro.

Dr. W. Mangum stated that Raleigh offered a standing invitation for the Conference. Wilmington was chosen.

The Bishop called for reports. No reports were made.

The Bishop announced the following as elected to Elders Orders: Elisha J. Eudaly, William Thompson, Hezekiah Farrar, Edmund D. Hoover.

To Deacons Orders: James B. Floyd, Brackett Dixon, Gray C. Garrison, and stated that at such time as should be appointed by the Committee on Divine Service he would ordain them to those orders respectively.

On motion of N. H. D. Wilson, the Bishop was authorized to draw on the Trustees of the Conference in favor of the Joint Board of Finance for \$238.00.

The name of John H. Anderson was placed on the list of local deacons elected to elders' orders.

Dr. Moran submitted a report from the Committee on the Bible Cause.

A. W. Mangum spoke in high terms of the present agent for the Bible Society in North Carolina.

The report was adopted.

Dr. W. Mangum by permission addressed the Conference in behalf of the enterprise of building a new Methodist Church in Raleigh.

The Bishop bowed Bro. Mangum's appeals would be seconded and sustained.

Dr. McFerrin thought it especially important that the Methodists of North Carolina should have a good house of worship at the Capital of the State.

R. G. Barrett moved that a committee be appointed to take the matter in hand, and report a plan of carrying out this enterprise.

Adopted. The committee was appointed as follows: W. J. W. Crowder, L. S. Burkhead, N. H. D. Wilson.

LOCAL BOATS.

Import Entries for sale at the office of THE MORNING STAR. The Legislative proceedings will be found on our second page this morning. The Schr. H. F. Marlor, with 400 tons of iron for the C. O. Railway, has arrived. The Schr. Lucy Holmes, Teel, cleared from Boston for this port on the 3rd inst. The Schr. Wm. Connors, French, arrived at Philadelphia from this port on the 4th inst. The Schr. Sargent S. Day, MoFarland, arrived at Boston from this port on the 4th inst. The Barque Ellida, Klen, arrived at Rotterdam from this port via Deal, on the 1st inst. There were no cases of importance before the Mayor's Court yesterday morning. The British Brig Elizabeth Taylor, Taylor, sailed from Havana for this port on the 2nd inst. Both printing and ruling done in the finest grades of copying ink at the STAR Job Printing Office. Generally clear weather and north or west winds, with lower temperature, predicted for this section to-day. Wilmington has been chosen as the next place of meeting of the North Carolina Conference of the M. E. Church. A shower of rain and sleet fell here last night, between 9 and 10 o'clock, which lasted but a few minutes, when the clouds dispersed. The gas-lights have got into a habit of "winking and blinking" for the last two or three nights in such a manner as to render it provoking. The Norwegian Brig Dacopa, Capt. Andersen, which cleared from this port for Liverpool yesterday, takes out a cargo of 813 bales of cotton. A severe wind and rain storm passed over this city Sunday night, which assumed almost the proportions of a hurricane between 9 and 10 o'clock, but we have heard of no damage resulting. At a meeting of Wilmington Steam Fire Engine Company No. 1, held last night, it was decided to change the name of their engine to the "Little Giant," or at least to christen their new one by that name. The Schr. C. W. Holt, Capt. Delany, from New York for this port, with iron for the Carolina Central Railway, was reported in below yesterday. The Schr. Seventy-Six, Capt. Rivers, was also reported in below. A few days since two seamen deserted from the German Barque Claudia, Capt. Dinne, and yesterday one of them, named William Alsen, was arrested and sent to his vessel, which had cleared for Liverpool. A colored man by the name of George Washington, who was committed by Justice McQuigg, a few days since, in default of payment of \$10 and costs in a case of assault and battery, paid the amount yesterday and was released from custody. One of the colored street prisoners, named Joe Cox, who was bound over on the 13th ult., for his appearance at the next term of the Superior Court, on the charge of stealing a cow, the property of James Mosely, and who was granted the privilege of working on the streets, in the chain-gang, until Court, made his escape yesterday. The prisoners were at work on the new road being laid out to Oakdale Cemetery, and seizing a favorable opportunity, Cox darted off. He was pursued for about four miles, but succeeded in distancing the guard and getting away. He will probably make for Wayne county, where he lived before coming to this county.

Extracts from the Proceedings. At the regular monthly meeting of the Board of County Commissioners, held yesterday, commencing at 10 o'clock, the following business was transacted, present, Chairman pro tem, J. G. Wagner and Commissioners, VanAmringe, Morris and Nixon. Application of Thos. B. Carr, for reduction of double tax, was referred to the Finance Committee. Application of Caroline George, for relief, referred to the Poor Committee. Application of Abram Moore, to be relieved of double tax, was referred to the Finance Committee. John H. Brown was appointed Ranger for the county. The following applications for retailing spirituous liquors were read: Jno. G. Oldenbuntel, Fergus & Co., C. H. Sparkman, John Meyer, Agent, Cudjop Larkins. Application of Katie Savage, for reduction of one-half of taxes, was granted. Application of H. E. Scott, J. W. St. George, D. L. Saunders, and others, for repair of road between Smith's Creek and the city, was referred to the Committee on Roads and Bridges. The Chairman asked for further time to examine the Superior Court Clerk's books, which was granted. Application of Jas. D. Sellars, for payment of bill of jurors in case of processioning, was not granted. Application for reduction of double tax in case of J. D. Walker was granted, and ordered that the Tax Collector be notified of the same. Application of Edward Bealy, for relief, was referred to the Poor Committee. Application of W. W. The Treasurer's statement for the month of November was received and ordered to be filed.

REPORTED DROWNING CASE.

On Sunday night, between the hours of 10 and 11 o'clock, officers King and Rouark, of the police force, who were in the vicinity, heard some one call for a boat at Messrs. Worth & Worth's wharf, foot of Mulberry street. Soon thereafter a boat came to the wharf and the officers heard a man jump in, followed immediately after by a plunge in the river. One of the policemen remarked to the other that some one was in the river, and instantly afterward cries for help came from the direction of the wharf. They hastened to the place where the cries were heard and saw a man standing in a boat, nearly under the bows of the Steamship Pioneer, lying at the end of Messrs. Worth & Worth's wharf. As they approached the wharf they heard the struggles of the man in the river and upon their arrival they sung out to him to hold on to whatever was in his reach for a moment and they would save him. There was no reply, but they hastened their arrangements, when the man in the boat, who proved to be a Norwegian, spoke excitedly, in broken English, pointing downward into the water, giving them to understand that the man had gone down there. The officers made what effort they could to recover the body, but not succeeding they finally relinquished the attempt, it being their impression that it had lodged under the steamship. Another attempt to recover it was made yesterday morning, but without success. We did not learn the name of the unfortunate man, but hear that he belonged on board of a Norwegian barquentine lying on the opposite side of the river. The man in the boat could not speak English well enough to give the officers any information on the subject.

ARRIVED AT LAST.

The Spanish Barque Ellida, which arrived at the quarantine station near Smithville some time in August last from Havana, and was detained there until the terrific gale of the 28th of September, when she was blown over on her side and filled with water, has at last been raised and arrived at this port yesterday morning in charge of the Wilmington Wrecking Company. The hull is reported to be in very good condition, but the sails will have to be replaced and the rigging, especially on the port side, which remained so long exposed to the water, is very much damaged. She will undergo the necessary repairs, painting, &c., and then take a cargo for some foreign port.

The Federal Court continued the Sessions case until yesterday. The Maxim Gas Machine Co., of New York, wish to erect gas works in Goldsboro. Concord Sun: Capt. Jacob McCurdy, living near Pioneer Mills, had his arm and hand badly mangled last week in a cotton gin. The mill of Mr. J. M. Mosely at Whitaker's mill, Nash county, burned last week, was insured for \$2,000. John Hicks, an honest, hard working negro, living near Battleboro in Edgewood county, lost \$70 in specie and \$40 in greenbacks by a burglar last week. The Rookingham Pee Dee Courier has been sold by Rev. Mr. Sandford to Mr. John Duckett, Associate Editor, and Mr. Clarence P. Erwin, of Greenville, S. C. The Courier has a clean and prosperous look. Reidsville Enterprise: On Tuesday morning last, Wm. Farris, negro, entered the house of W. T. Osborne, section master on Piedmont Railroad, armed with a large knife in one hand and a razor in the other, and in the presence of Mr. O's wife and mother broke open the bureau drawers and carried away notes, money and jewelry to the amount of \$1,000. He came from the neighborhood of Milton, and was arrested in that town on Thursday. He is now in Wentworth jail. Part of the stolen property was found on his person and the remainder in the woods about one mile from Mr. Osborne's house.
