OUTLINES.

Satrap Sheridan dispersed the Louisians Legislature, a la Cromwell, yesterday. The leading New York press generally denounce the conduct of Satrap Sheridan in New Orleans on yesterday. -Two centenarians have lately died in Columbia, S. THE SITUATION IN LOUISINA.

The New Orleans papers have denounced in the strongest terms Sheridan's interference on Monday with the Legislature of Louisiana. Elsewhere this morning their comments and what news there is concerning the situation in that unhappy State are presented in brief.

In its editorial summary of the situation up to Monday morning the New York Tribune, which enjoys superior advantages of information,

On the eve of meeting of the Legislature, one of the many persons claiming to be elected to that body was arrested for felony; two others—declining to accept improperly awarded certificates of the Returning Board -refuse to go to the capital, and a fourth is not promptly on the ground. These things change the complexion fixed for the Legislature by the manipulations of the Returning Board, and that body now proposes to reconvene and count in a sufficient number of Republicans to fill the seats of the missing claimants. To add to the complications of the situation, the Metropolitan Police Brigade-Kellogg's last organized adherents, who bore the brunt of the fight on the 14th of September-have revolted, because their salaries have not been paid since August; and Kellogg calls upon the United States troops, who nave been at his disposal so long, to do police duty in their stead. All this comes of the Administration's persistent encouragement and support of the baseless claims of the carpettrouble is to cease until the people of Louisiana possess the privilege of governing them-

The outrage in Louisiana was spiritedly discussed in Congress yesterday, and Senator Thurman and others stood up nobly for the principles of constitutional liberty-defending the people of Louisiana from foul aspersions and arraigning the bayonet policy of the administration. The thanks of the whole country are specially due to Mr. Thurman for his prompt and able action in the Senate in the matter of Senatorial enquiry of the President.

The "Queen of Tragedy."

It is rare indeed that the amusement loving public of Wilmington, the patrons of histrionic art in its purity and grandeur, is treated to such an entertainment as will be given them at the Opera House on Saturday night, when the peerless and incomparable Janauschek will appear in the new play entitled "Earl of Essex."

We quote a paragraph or two from a criticism which we find in the Buffalo Courier, of nearly two columns in length:

"There was another very large audience at the Academy of Music last night, and a better pleased assemblage rarely seen with-in its walls. * * * In the closing scene which reveals the conflict between the impulses of her heart and her sense of duty as the Queen she was wonderfully effective, and the play of feeling cannot be adequately described. The scene in the second act in which she exhibits her womanly consciousness of the presence of Essex, while failing to give him the slightest recognition as the Queen and addresses the ministers, promising them justice against the man she loves, was incomparably fine. In the third act, her scenes with the various characters we have already mentioned, would require a long chapter to characterize. So womanly and fine and subtle were their interviews that we should only dare to approach consideration of them with our best wits at our command, and with abundant time in which to exercise them. It were an easy matter to deal with them flippantly, but in commentary upon any of Janauschek's performances we can take no careless liberties with the pen, for to be in her presence is to be in a shrine consecrated to art. In the scene in which she charges Essex with felony and treason, and dashes the baton which she has wrenched from his hand against him, she was the infuriated Elizabeth, and sublime indeed was her over whelming rage; but it remained to the fourth act, when she discovers the cheat that Essex and Lady Rutland have prac-ticed upon her, to release all the fury of her nature; and how fearful was the whirlwind of her passion as she pronounces the death sentence of Essex, may be imagined, but i defies description. To indicate the delicate lights and shades of Janauschek's Elizabeth, to follow her through her varying moods, to depict the depth and expression of her every emotion, to give color to her thoughts and to fathom her passion and despair, the lover of art must do for himself: the pen of the critic fails utterly; and we must remain content with a fragmentary commentary as feeble as Janauschek's portraiture was grand.

The Alleged Homicide al Point Cas-

Coroner Hewlett called on us yesterday, and gave his version of the facts connected with the death of Grace Watson, at Point Caswell, the colored woman alluded to in our last under the head of "Probable Homicide." The woman died on Monday and Justice Thompson, of that place, thinking an inquest should be held at once, appointed Mr. A. V. Horrell for that purpose .-Coroner Hewlett arrived at the Point late on Tuesday and found Mr. Horrell in the act of holding the inquest, having examined the witnesses and Dr. George F. Lucas being engaged at the time in examining the body. Upon his arrival Mr. Horrell surrendered the entire matter into his (Coroner Hewlett's) hands. The result of Dr, Lucas' examination is found in his written evidence, as follows:

After thorough and careful examination of the body of Grace Watson I find no evidence of violence or injury. On examination of the brain I found a rupture of a blood vessel, which in my opinion was sufficient and did cause her death; or, in other words, in my opinion she died of apoplexy.

Based on this opinion of the physician conducting the examination the jury returned a verdict that deceased came to her death by apoplexy.

Thus the affair was disposed of for the time being, but as a warrant has been issued for the arrest of the man Lamont, who is alleged in the affidavit made before Justice Cassidey to have committed an assault upon the woman, the matter will probably hereafter undergo, if possible, a more thorough and searching investigation.
