Mr. Johnson showed that the limits of the President's power to use military force in any State of the Union are prescribed by act of Congress, 1795, and are confined to cases of insurrection. This and a subsequeut act authorizing the use of the army and navy, under the same conditions, was to protect each State from domestic violence when called upon by Legislature, or State executive when the Legislature is not in " session. Now, in this instance there is not the least evidence of insurrection in Louisiana on the 4th of January, or afterwards; nor that the President had been called upon to

put down an insurrection by the Governor of the State.

Referring to Sheridan's dispatch Mr. Johnson said:

"Since civilization favorably progressed under the influence of our Christian faith, no words ever fell from the lips of any man, civilian or soldier, which more out-rage every obligation of humanity or exhibit a more fiendish thirst for human blood. Not satisfied with denouncing the people of three States, he suggests that if the President will issue a proclamation declaring the parties he refers to 'banditti,' 'no further action need be taken except that which would devolve upon' him!

NO CONVENTION.

We have received a private letter from an eminently wise politician in this State on the subject of Convention. He says: " There is danger .--It will be hard to get the whites out. The negroes are organized, and can be got to the polls at any time. I do not think a bill can be passed. I understand the members from Chatham, Davidson, Wilson, Franklin, Nash and other counties are strongly opposed to the proposition. A big effort will, however, be made to get a bill through."
