SUB-COMMITTER'S REPORT.

Synopsis of the Report of the Congressional Sub-Committee on Loui-

The report of Messrs. Foster (Rep.), Potter (Dem.) and Phelps (Rep.), bemg the sub-committee of the Congressional committee on Louisiana affairs, has been published, after it was impossible for the Radical leaders to prevail on these gentlemen to longer withhold it. It is a fair and honest report, the effect of which the whitewashing report of the Radical members of the large committee now in New Orleans will be totally inadequate to impair.

The points of the sub-committee's report are these in brief:

First-That the last election in Louisiana was, in the words of the committee, "full, fair, free and peaceable." Second-That it resulted in the

election of a Democratic majority of twenty-nine in the lower house of the Legislature. Third-That the report of the Re-

turning Board was fraudulent, unjust which it acted.

This carries us to the assembling of the Legislature. Here we find these facts undisputed:-

First-The Returning Board had prepared a list of one hundred and six members, of whom, under its manipulations, fifty-three were Republicans, as was supposed, and fiftythree Democrats. Thus this Board attempted to set aside the will of the people of the State.

Second-One handred and six members met on the 4th of January and proceeded to choose a Speaker, the Republicans present actually taking part in the proceedings by nominating a caddidate for Speaker and voting for him, by accepting appointments as part of a Committee on Credeutials and organizing with this committee and by their votes in the House on the Speakership giving a quorum, which the Democrats then present would not alone have had. Wiltz received fifty-five votes, Hahn (Repubcan), two, and one was blank; and fifty-six is the constitutional quorum. When the members were sworn in fifty-one Democrats and five Repubins took the oath, making an disputable and regular quorum of the

House. Third-The Legislature was thereafter dispersed by United States

Fourth-The Republicans proceeded to organize, but-here is the important and vital point-they had and have no quorum, and cannot, therefore, act as a Legislature. They may adjourn from day to day; but, under the Louisiana constitution, can

SOURCES OF THE NILE.

The Region Gen. Colston is to Explore.

-NEW YORK, Jan. 7, 1875. The recent discoveries in the Victoria Lake basin of Lieutenant Col. Long, an enterprising American officer in the service of the Khedive of Egypt, and of Lieutenant Cameron, a British explorer at the south end of Lake Tanganyike, are valuable contri butions toward the settlement of the Nile sources, but they do not reach the main question nor weaken the conclusion of Livingstone and Stanley, that the general outlet of Livingstone's magnificent interior system of springs, lakes and rivers lying west the popular sentiment in the matter.
