CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

DECLARED VALID.

On Tuesday the Supreme Court de clared in the case of the University vs. McIver the validity of the Constitutional amendments passed in 1873. The decision of a large majority of the Court was made up at the last term, but as the Chief Justice was absent and it was desirable, the case being a constitutional one, to have all the Justices present, the opinion was not then promulgated.

The points in the case were these: 1st, was the amendment concerning the University duly ratified? 2nd, supposing it to have been duly adopted, was the election of Trustees in conformity therewith?

The decision of the majority was rendered by Justice Bynum. It is clear, direct and cogent opinion, and affirms the validity of the amendment and the right of the Legislature to elect the Trustees. A dissenting opinion, which has no yet been printed, was pronounced by Chief Justice

This decision is peculiarly gratifying at this time. It removes one of the clogs that impede the progress of University resuscitation. Beside this it apolishes one of the chief arguments of those who advocate a Convention, for the seven other amendments, passed by two Legislatures and ratified by an overwhelming majority by the people, are to be reckoned as following this one. If, then, the Constitution can be amended slowly but surely and without danger to the Conservative party by the Legislative method, why should we resort to the Conventional method, so full of hazard?
