Carolina Central Railway.

By request, we publish the following, in reference to the proceedings against some of the officials of the Carolina Central Railway Company, to which allusion was made in these columns yesterday:

It seems the Company are advised by the highest legal authority that under their charter it has a right to run its road or any " branch, branches or feeders" through any property it may desire, except it shall not invade individual dwelling houses or family burial grounds. And that if the owner of the land and the Company cannot agree on the amount of damages caused by building the track through the land, either party may apply for commissioners to assess the same. and if the commissioner's report be unsatisfactory, either party may appeal to the Superior Court, and if the decision there is unsatisfactory, either party may again appeal, which would require several years for final adjustment.


