WASHINGTON.

Presentation of Petitions—Debate on the Civil Rights Bill.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4. CONGRESSIONAL. SENATE.—Numerous petitions were presented against the restoration of the duty on tea and coffee, or the revival of any internal taxation, and for a repeal of the act of 1872 relieving certain foreign products of ten per cent. duty. Referred to the Finance Committee.

HOUSE.—The debate on the Civil Rights bill is in progress, and will close at two o'clock, when the vote will be taken. There is an immense crowd in the galleries.

KENTUCKY.

Defence of Southern Presbyterians—Failure of the Conference between the Northern and Southern Branch of the Church.

LOUISVILLE, Feb. 4. Dr. Stuart Robinson, who represents the Southern branch of the Presbyterian Church, in a statement last night, defended that body against the charge, that the conference failed of its main object because of the unwillingness of the Southern members to fulfill the conditions asked by the Northern division.

NEW YORK.

Railroad Magnets in Council.

New York, Feb. 4. Representatives of the Saratoga Railroad Commission held their second session here to-day. It was suggested that the power of the Board of Commissioners of the Western Railroad be suspended, so far as relates to freight business, until further order. The Bureau continues its functions regarding passenger fares.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.

Democrats Summing Witnesses to Rebut Report of Alabama Investigating Committee—The Pension Law—Vigorous Assault on Butler in the House.

The Democrats have summoned witnesses in rebuttal of testimony taken by the Alabama Investigating Committee. The report will be delayed several days. In Executive session, the Senate rejected the reciprocity treaty with Canada. A Joint Committee to investigate Arkansas, Alabama and Louisiana has been appointed, the committee to draft a bill.

Financial.

Money is in good supply at 2 1/2 per cent. Sterling exchange heavy at 48 1/2. Gold inactive at 114 1/2. Government securities dull but strong. State bonds quiet and nominal. Stocks closed dull but steady.

Commercial.

Cotton—steady with sales of 2,722 bales at 15 1/2. Southern flour dull and prices unchanged—common to fair extra, \$4 70 to \$5.40. Wheat heavy and quiet, lower with very limited demand, at \$1.20 1/2 to 1/4 for winter red western; at \$1.24 1/2 to 1/4 for amber; at \$1.25 1/2 to 1/4 for white do. Corn opened firm, but closed heavy, at 88 1/4 cents for new Western mixed; 84 cents for yellow do, and 83 1/4 cents for white do. Sugar very dull and heavy. Rice firm, with fair jobbing demand. Tallow steady at 21 cents. Rosin and turpentine steady. Pork firmer—prime steam 14 1/2 cents. Whisky lower at 92 1/2 cents. Freights firmer.
