Mr. Busbee, a bill concerning fire companies. Calendar. Mr. Young called up House bill, paying

the contractors of the Marion and Asheville Turnpike Road the sum of \$8,644 23. The question was discussed at some length as to the constitutionality of the act noder which this work was done. The bill passed its third reading by a vote of 20 to 12.

Mr. Cooke called up bill to amend the charter of the city of Newbern. Tucker, col., opposed the bill. Enough legislation of this kind had been done already, enough harm had been done by it, and he hoped the "gentlemanly portion of the Legislature" would vote the bill down. He offered an amendment that the first and second wards shall have only one Alderman each. Lost

Mr. Busbee's motion to change the name to Bragg was considered and adopted. After considerable discussion and further amendment, the bill failed to pass its second reading by a decided vote, the roll not being called.

THE USURY BILL.

Bill to Be Entitled An Act to Regulate the flate of Interest and to Prevent Usury.

Reprinted from the Morning Star of Jan-

SECTION 1. The General Assembly of North Curolina do Enact, That the legal rate of interest shall be six per cent. per annum, or for such time as interest may accrue, and no more; Provided, however, That upon special contract in writing, signed by the party to be charged therewith, or his agent, so great a rate as eight per cent. may be allowed.

Sec. 2. That no person, banking institution, corporation, or company, upon any contract shall directly or indirectly take for loans of any moneys, wares, merchandise, real estate, or commodities whatever, above the value of six dollars or eight dollars as provided in section first of this act, by way of discount or interst for the forbearance of one hundred dol lars for one year, and so after the rate as above specified for a greater time. All bonds, contracts, and assurances whatsoever, for the payment of any principal or money to be upon or for any usury, wherenpon or whereby there shall be reserved or taken above the rate of six dollars on the hundred as aforesaid shall be void, and every person, banking institution, corporation or company, who, upon any contract, shall take, accept and receive, by way of any corrupt bargain, loan or other means whatsoever, for the forbcaring or giving day of payment, a rate of interest greater than hereinbefore specified, shall forfeit and lose for every such offence, the double value of the moneys, wares, merchandise or real estate so lent, bargained or exchanged to any per-

son who will sue for the same. Sec. 3. That every person, bank ing institution, corporation or comof any banking institution, corpora- of the city. tion or company, who shall violate the provisions of this act, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and, on conviction in the Superior Court, shall be fined not less than one hundred dollars nor more than one thousand dollars.

SEC. 4. That the provisions of this act shall not be construed to apply to any existing contract made in conformity with law, nor to invalidate any remedy or rights now exercised by any Building and Loan Association for the redemption of their own

Sec. 5. That all laws or clauses of laws in conflict with this act are hereby repealed.

Sec. 6. That this act shall take effect and be in force thirty days from and after its ratification.
