PASSAGE OF THE STATE DEBT BILL. On last Wednesday evening, by a vote of 83 to 25, the House of Representatives passed the bill to compromise the State debt.

THE WESTERN N. C. R. R. BILL. House bill (known as the Tate bill) concerning the Western North Carolina Railroad, passed its third reading on Wednesday night.
