HURRICANE AND FRESHET.

Fearful losses in Chatham—New Judge McKoy's Court was Broken Up—The storm at Hillsboro.

A correspondent of the Raleigh News writing from Pittsboro describes the great storm of last Saturday: The tornado came from a westerly direction, and was preceded by a fearful stillness in the atmosphere, soon followed by a loud roaring as of distant and continuous cannoning.

Judge McKoy was holding the session of the Superior Court in the court house at the time the hurricane struck that building. It ripped particles of tin off the roof and carried pieces to the distance of a quarter of a mile.

The Presbyterian Church, the only brick house of worship in the place, and the prettiest church edifice in the county, is one huge ruin.

The bell tower of the Baptist Church, together with the bell, window glass and sashes, were swept in all directions, parts being found 50 and 75 yards away from the building.

Seven large oaks on the premises of Capt. Denon were torn up by the roots, and his kitchen and other out-buildings were entirely demolished.

The roof of one large dwelling was taken away entirely, together with two chimneys of the building.

Hon. John Manning had one large chimney to fall on his house, crushing in the roof. Another dwelling had four large chimneys overthrown.

At the lowest calculation 35-kitchens and dwellings were destroyed, and about 40 or 50 large chimneys shared a like fate.

The damage all through the country about here is incalculable. One man, west of town, had his dwelling house completely demolished and his wife sustained severe injuries.

The mail boy, coming from Morrisville on horse-back, had a narrow escape; the mail bag was torn from under him and carried several hundred yards and lodged in a tree; he recovered it after the storm had passed.

No lives have been lost so far as heard from, though a great many small casualties have been reported. There is no telling the destruction done any distance from here, though it is supposed to have been a great deal.

It is estimated that \$15,000 will hardly repair the damage done in this immediate neighborhood.

Judge McKoy was forced to adjourn court on account of the damage done to the Court-house.

The Hillsboro Recorder says: The damage to fences in and about Hillsboro is considerable, blowing down fences in some places and prostrating houses. The wheat is greatly injured by the washing rains.
