HURRICANE AND PRESHET.

Fearful Losses in Chatham-How Judge McKey's Court Was Broken Up-The Storm at Hillsboro. A correspondent of the Raleig

News writing from Pittsboro describes the great storm of last Saturday: The tornado came from a westerly

direction, and was preceded by a fear-ful stillness in the atmosphere, soon followed by a loud roaring as of distant and continuous canonading. It lasted for the space of two minutes, and was accompanied by a water spout which broke over the town, de-

luging everything for a short time.

Judge McKoy was holding the session of the Superior Court in the court house at the time the hurricane struck that building. It ripped particles of tin off the roof and carried pieces to the distance of a quarter of a mile. Half of the roof fell in, and the Judge losing his presence of mind, for a mo-ment only, exclaimed: "Gentlemen, we leave the verdict of this case in the hands of God," and immediately went to one of the jury room windows to jump out, but the folly of the attempt then flashed on his mind, and by resisting the inclination he saved his life, as the court room is on the second floor of the building, and 30 feet from the ground below. The whole top of the building is honeycombed through and through and if it rains again before the roof can be repaired the building will be a complete rain.

The Presbyterian Church, the only brick house of worship in the place, and the prettiest church edifice in the county, is one huge rum. The steeple was carried away and fell upon the roof, crushing it through into the body of the building.

The belfry to the Baptist Church, together with the bell, window glass and sashes, were swept in all direc-

tions, parts being found 50 and 75 yards away from the building,

Seven large oaks on the premises of Capt. Denson were torn up by the roots, and his kitchen and other outbuildings were entirely demolished. The roof of one large dwelling was taken away entirely, together with two chimneys of the building.

Hon. John Manning had one large

chimney to fall on his house, crushing in the roof. Another dwelling had four large chimneys overthrown

At the lowest calculation 25 kitchens and dwellings were destroyed, and about 40 or 50 large chimneys shared a like fate. Fences are down in every direction and rails and carpenters are in demand

The damage all through the country about here is incalcuable. One man, west of town, had his dwelling house completely demolished and his wife til Saturday next, sustained severe injuries. The mail boy, coming from Mor-
