An Indian 123 Years Old.

[From the Santa Cruz (Cal.) Enterprise.] The Mission of Santa Cruz was established by monks of the Order of St. Francis. The first record which they preserved of a baptism was that of an Indian girl, named Micaela, on Oct. 9, 1791. On the 4th of March following was baptized Justiniano Roxas, by Fr. Isidro Salazar, O. S. F. Roxas was then forty years of age, and perhaps even somewhat over forty, so that he was at least 123 years old when he died. The record of his baptism is still preserved in the register of the Catholic church, so that there can be no doubt concerning the truth of his extreme age.

Little is known of his career, as he has outlived those who were children when he was already very advanced in years. It is probable, however, that he belonged to the Aptos tribe of Indians. For some time he had been quite feeble, and his death was expected to take place at any moment. Three days ago the Rev. Father Adam administered the last sacraments. At the hour of his death Roxas was attended by the Indian who has been his guardian for some time past. He remained conscious until within a few moments of his death, when he became insensible, and quietly passed into the world beyond. We believe we do not exaggerate in saying that Roxas was the oldest inhabitant of the earth.
