Gen. Johnston and the Centennial. Gen. Joseph E. Johnston, the great Confederate strategist, has been chosen to act as Chief Marshal at the North Carolina Centennial of Independence, on the 20th of May, 1875.

Savannah, Ga., March 26, 1875. Dear Sir:—I have just had the pleasure of receiving your favor of the 24th inst., informing me of your selection as Chief Marshal on the occasion of the celebration of the Mecklenburg Declaration of Independence.

—We learn that there is a colored woman living on Nun, between Second and Third streets, who has reached the advanced age of 115 years. —We learn from Wm. A. Green, Clerk, that the Market bell for closing the Market, commencing with to-day, will be rung at 10 o'clock A. M. —The Public Schools of the city will be examined to-morrow, Friday. Parents and friends of the pupils are invited to attend. The schools are to have a vacation of one week.

—W. P. Canaday Esq., requests us to say that he is not a candidate for the nomination for Convention, and would refuse to run for the position if he should receive the nomination. —Now for balmy breezes and modest April showers in place of blustering March winds and cold, dreary rains. —The men who have been selling small red balloons on the streets for some time past, with something after the fashion of a "sousedunk" accompaniment to attract customers, were ordered by the authorities yesterday to pay a license tax of \$5 or leave town within an hour. They concluded to leave. —Rev. Elias Hanes, the blind preacher, will preach again at the Second Baptist church to-night at 7 1/2 o'clock. Sent On. A white man by the name of Milton Bartley, who was arrested on Tuesday and lodged in jail, on a capias from Mecklenburg county, was sent to Charlotte yesterday in charge of an officer. The complaint against Bartley is for fighting.

Arrived. The new truck of the Fifth Ward Independent Bucket Company No. 1 arrived from New York on the steamship Benefactor yesterday. It is a very handsome truck, light and very easily managed. It is from the manufactory of Fred. J. Miller, 65 Liberty street, N. Y., and its equipments consist of four ladders, three of which can be joined together, making an extension ladder thirty-two feet in length, one large chain hook and four roof hooks, four lanterns, three rubber buckets, eight of which came with the truck. There are hooks for the buckets, eight on the top of the truck and eight underneath; but these will not constitute all the buckets to be used. The company were on hand and took the truck to a position in front of Messrs. Adrian & Vollers' store, where it remained for some time, after which it was taken to the truck house on Fifth, between Nun and Church streets, which is a very convenient building for the purpose. On the sides of the truck is neatly painted the words, "5th W. I. B. Co. No. 1."

The Can-Can in Macon, Ga.—A Shooting Affair. A shooting affair occurred at Macon, Ga., on Friday night last between Tom Perry, trapeze performer with the Female Minstrels and Can-Can Company, advertised to perform in this city on the 8th and 9th insts., and a young Maconite by the name of Schoeckly. It appears that after the performance that evening Schoeckly, who had become smitten with one of the young dancers connected with the troupe, sent her a note stating that he would call upon her at the Lanier House, where the troupe were stopping, and invited her to partake of champagne and oyster supper, &c. He subsequently repaired to the hotel and wended his way to the sitting room, where he expected to meet the charmer, when, as the account in the Savannah Morning News says, "he was suddenly knocked off his pins by a terrible blow from the lively genius who does the trapeze business, and another male attache of the troupe saluted him on the proboscis with a healthy bunch of fives. He was knocked about like a foot ball, and battered and bruised picked himself up the best he could and retreated rapidly."

Determined upon revenge, however, Schoeckly, with some of his friends, repaired to the depot on Sunday night, when the company were about leaving the city, and immediately opened fire upon Perry, wounding him seriously. The affair created great excitement, nearly the entire population of Macon flocking to the scene. At last accounts the wounded man was in Atlanta in a dangerous condition.

The Houtz troupe. The ladies, of course, will let the Can-Can troupe, who perform here next week, severely alone. But for the benefit of the gentlemen who may be interested in this matter we give the following from the Macon Telegraph: "We regret to hear that considerable disappointment was experienced by many Benedicts at the nature of the performance at Lanier on Friday night. After tearing themselves from the delights and comforts of slippers and dressing gowns and the sweet prattle and loving words of wives and little ones, it was too bad, they thought, to find so little that was naughtily nice in the 'Can-Can.' They complained that the dresses were too long and the dancers too modest. They fondly hoped for a big revel in the results of contraband contortions and suggestive sallies. As one of them remarked, almost with tears in his eyes: 'Only to the garters after all!' Then he walked off, mournfully humming, 'Where are now the hours I cherished?'"

The same paper adds: "The Can-Can performance was not what was expected. It did not violate all the rules of decency and propriety. It was not a gross outrage upon all the laws of morality. There have been many coarser performances in the hall by highly reputable companies."

It was finally decided, however, to postpone the organization of the company until to-morrow (Friday) evening, when another meeting will be held at the same hour and place. U. S. Commissioner's Court. Henry Williams, colored, was arrested on a warrant issued by U. S. Commissioner J. J. Cassidy, yesterday, charged with selling cigars at retail without having secured the necessary license. Defendant was ordered to give security in the sum of \$100 for his appearance at the office of the Commissioner on Monday next at 10 o'clock, in default of which he was committed to jail.

Gerken, took place last night and was attended by quite a large number of invited guests. The room is 38 by 26 feet, is fitted up in fine style, with H. W. Collender's carom and pocket tables, private cue racks, elegant mirrors, &c. The hall is brilliantly lighted with gas, and is altogether, no doubt, the finest billiard hall in the State. On the first floor of the establishment, in the rear, is an elegantly furnished saloon, to which will be added a cigar and tobacco store in front.
