Petersburg News: The case involving the adjustment of the boundary line between Maryland and Virginia submitted to ex-Governor W. A. Graham, of North Carolina, and Hon. Jeremiah Black, of Pennsylvania, as arbitrators, with ex-Gov. Chas. J. Jenkins, of Georgia, as umpire, is progressing satisfactorily. The next meeting of the arbitrators takes place, by their appointment, at Washington on the 10th day of May next, when the great body of the testimony on both sides will be before them.

Its new paper, the Transcript, thus speaks of Toisnot: It is a new depot on the Wilmington and Weldon Railroad, seven miles north of Wilson. It is situated on one of the highest localities on the road, though it is level and admirably drained, and for health it is not surpassed by any other village in Eastern North Carolina. Its business is improving and its number of inhabitants increasing almost daily. The first building was erected in the summer of 1873; now it has more than twenty private residences and upwards of two hundred inhabitants. It has one large hotel and other boarding houses, two carriage shops, one drug store, three resident physicians, one church—Methodist—a Masonic Lodge and Good Templar's Hall, a Grange of the Patrons of Husbandry, besides eleven stores and shops, three or four of which are considerable stores of general merchandise. It is surrounded with a rich and prosperous back country from which its merchants draw a profitable and increasing trade. It has a high school with competent teachers and a good number of students. Local Notes. The Board of Aldermen meet this evening. This is examination day in the public schools of the city. A large fire was raging in the woods East of the city yesterday. Regular meeting of Calanthe Lodge No. 7, K. of P., this evening. The Schr. John, Gabriel, arrived at New York from this port on the 29th ult. The Schr. Sallie C. Morton, Callen, cleared from New York for this port on the 29th ult. The L'Arioso Pleasure Club gave one of their pleasant "hops" at the Opera House last evening. Rev. Dr. A. A. Watson, Rector of St. James' Church, leaves on a brief visit to Florida early next week.

There is quite a large amount of shipping in port just now, a large proportion of which is foreign. Of the latter there were several arrivals yesterday. There was only one trifling case before the City Court yesterday morning. Whiskey was at the bottom of it. Very few of the tricks incident to the 1st of April were perpetrated yesterday. Some few, however, were badly "sold." The necessary preliminary steps are to be taken this week for the formation of a Degree Lodge of Good Templars in Wilmington. Brother Osteen, of the Sumter True Southron, is in the city, and has not yet determined to decline advertisements for his paper. Sixty-three persons listed their taxes on real estate and personal property yesterday. The hours for listing are from 9 A. M. to 3 P. M. Remember the meeting at the armory room of the Wilmington Light Infantry, this evening, for the purpose of forming a light artillery company. The ringleaders, of the recent mutiny in the county jail have all been securely locked in their cells, where they will be kept in close confinement until Court. A white man was arrested and lodged in the Guard House yesterday morning on the charge of drunkenness on the street. He had "been there" before and knew how it was himself. We noticed a stock of timber on the wharf yesterday which had been brought all the way from Liverpool in the Norwegian Brig De Capo, for the purpose of being made into a mast. We announce again that marriage and obituary notices are charged as advertisements, and that those received by mail will not be inserted unless accompanied with a responsible name. The Fayetteville Independent Light Infantry and the Lafayette Light Infantry Companies of Fayetteville will pass through this city on their way to the Mecklenburg Centennial celebration on the 20th of May. Fine marl sidewalks have been laid on both sides of Fourth, all the way from Walnut to Swann streets, except in a few localities where brick pavements had been or are to be put down. This is a great and much needed improvement. Rev. Elias Hanes, the blind preacher, who is causing so much excitement in the Southern portion of the city, by what his hearers term his discourses and startling views of the doctrinal points of the Bible, has given his consent to preach again in the Second Baptist Church to-night at 7 o'clock. Subject: "The Two Strong Men."

Arrested and Locked Up.

On Tuesday last the authorities of the city received a telegram from Sheriff McMillan, of Robeson county, stating that a gentleman of Lumberton had been robbed of \$200 in money, and requesting that a sharp lookout should be kept for the thieves, three young men who had been following the Mexican Show in its travels. Yesterday morning the proprietor of the show, which had arrived here the evening previous, called at the City Hall and asked for an officer, saying that he could point out two of the young men alluded to in the telegram. A policeman was sent with him and with his assistance the two men, named Mathison and Roal, were arrested and taken to the Guard House, where they were locked up for safe-keeping until the Sheriff of Robeson shall apply for them. The proprietor of the show deserves much credit for his action in the matter. He says the young men commenced following the show in Georgia and have injured his business no little by representing that they were connected with it. One of them had a number of false keys in his possession, while both were supplied with equipments for gambling, &c. They are both mere youths, not more than from 17 to 19 years old. City Marshal Robinson telegraphed to Sheriff McMillan the fact of the arrest of the young men and he will probably arrive here this evening to take charge of the prisoners.

Magistrate's Court.

Before Justice VanAmringe, yesterday morning, Charles Mayor, colored, was arraigned on the charge of assault and battery upon the person of Lucy Brinkley, of the same persuasion. The defendant was found guilty, but the case was dismissed on the payment of costs. The same, arrested on a peace warrant sworn out by Lucy Brinkley, was ordered to give security in the sum of \$100 for his appearance at the next term of the Superior Court and to keep the peace, in default of which he was committed to jail. Alfred Williams, charged with forcible trespass. Case withdrawn by the prosecutor on condition that defendant pay the costs. Superior Court. The Sheriff informs us that there are seventy-one cases on the criminal docket remaining over from last Court, and for whom capias have been issued. Of these fully one-half have absconded or cannot be found, some of them leaving their bondsmen in the lurch. There is one man against whom there are three cases for larceny, in each of which he is known under a different name. From present indications Judge Kerr will have his hands full at the approaching term of the Court, which commences on the 19th inst. Honey Bridge. We learn from an eye-witness that a lady and child came near being run over on Honey bridge yesterday afternoon by a street car. The space for passing, it seems, is so limited that she became frightened and narrowly escaped serious injury, the conductor of the car being unable to put the brakes down in time. It is very important that a more substantial and convenient bridge should be placed over this great thoroughfare.

A Worthy Scheme.

A number of ladies of North Carolina, after consulting together on the subject, have issued a circular dated at Chapel Hill, in which they broach the praiseworthy scheme of raising a fund for the support and care of the poor and infirm among their own sex in the State. The circular says: "These ladies propose to raise such a sum as will purchase a house, with land attached, fit it up for occupation, and leave something to be invested for an income. Appeal is made to all parties and all denominations, and it is hoped the appeal will not fall on listless ears. Communications on the subject may be addressed to Mrs. C. P. The Mexican Show.

The attendance at the Mexican circus last night was rather limited. The accommodations were not superior or calculated to entice many spectators. The entire affair wore the impress of hard usage and worse appreciation. Some of the feats of wire walking and tumbling, in which the Monocacy family took part, were very good. There was a mournful lack of variety and spirit about the performance. The minstrel exhibition was sadly put and a poor attempt. The performance terminated rather suddenly by the lights going out prematurely. There will be an exhibition this afternoon and also one to-night, when the company should strive to give more strength and variety if possible to the performances.

Sudden Death.

Mr. John A. Parker, an old, well known and highly respected citizen of this place, where he had long conducted the business of painting, died suddenly yesterday from an attack of paralysis. Mr. Parker was at his shop during the forenoon, attending to his business as usual, being seized with the disease which terminated his life about 1 o'clock. A physician was sent for and he was taken home, where he remained in a speechless and insensible condition until his death, which occurred about 8 o'clock P. M. Mr. Parker, who was a consistent and zealous member of the Baptist Church, leaves a wife and several children, besides a large circle of attached friends, to mourn his sudden departure from among them.
