But we love the old State and her grand traditions, her stately history and her present good too well to be a faint-heart in this endeavor. We shall persist in the good cause until somebody essays the noble task to which he is invited by every consideration of State pride and high personal ambition.

We request that ex-Senator and Gen. Thomas L. The pains-taking geologist, the liberal scholar, the earnest orator and statesman, above all the proud North Carolinian, T. L. Clingman, is just the man to do the thing up brown. The necessity for the work being done thoroughly, something as a Macaulay, a Stanhope, and a Freeman did for England, is universally conceded. Clingman is yet in the vigor of 'an elderly prime-if we may be allowed to choose our phrase-and he could accomplish the task if properly sustained by official countenance and aid and by a liberal and enthusiastic publie sentiment. Will he undertake it? Can he refuse to do so great a service to the people who have in times past so generously honored him and who still respect and esteem him as one of the first of the sons of the State, if the spontaneous voice of that people shall set him apart as the right man found at last to record the heroic deeds of strife and stake that gild the very tree-tops on our lofty mountains and make immemorial music in the leavy coverts of our lowlands.


