#### LUCAL OPTION LAW.

An Act to Amend Sec. 5, Chap. 138, Laws 1873-74.

The General Assembly of North Carolina do enact, That Sec. 5, Chapter 138, laws of 1873-'74, be on the 2d inst. amended by striking out in line six, all after the word "Township," down to the word "and" in line seven, and insert the following: Until an election shall be held, under the permission and in the same manner, as prescribed in said chapter, and a majority of the votes so cast shall be against prohibition and in favor licenses. All laws or clauses of law in conflict with this act are hereby repealed. Ratified 25th day of Feb., 1875.
