OUTLINES.

Fearful tornado swept over Edinburg, Ill., yesterday, destroying a church which was occupied at the time and five dwellings. The same or another storm did some injury to life, limb and property near Little Rock. A New York conference has been held to make preparations for representatives in the Pan Presbyterian Assembly at London. Notice of attachment of Tweed's property has been filed. The full returns show that the late Connecticut election was the fullest ever held in that State. Sir John Gray, M. P. and a Dublin editor is dead. Prospective decrease in acreage in cotton in West Tennessee, North Alabama, North Mississippi and Northern Arkansas, according to report of Memphis Exchange, is estimated at 5-45 per cent. Mayor's Court.

The following cases were disposed of yesterday morning: Nathan Scott, charged with stealing a shawl and some other articles from Emma Burton (both parties colored), was found guilty and ordered to give security in the sum of \$100 for his appearance at the next term of the Superior Court. Edward Hill, charged with fighting, &c., on the street, was ordered to pay a fine of \$10 and costs or work for twenty days on the streets. Henry James, charged with fighting and other disorderly conduct on the streets, was ordered to give bond in the sum of \$10 and costs or work for twenty days on the streets. Jordan Huske, recognized to appear as a witness at the next term of the Superior Court, was afraid he would not be able to attend. He was ordered to give security in the sum of \$50, whereupon he declared that he knew of nothing to interfere with his attendance. He was then released on his own recognizance. Two persons, a male and a female, were arraigned on the charge of disorderly conduct, but were discharged on the payment of costs.

County Commissioners.

A called meeting of the Board of County Commissioners was held yesterday afternoon; present, J. G. Wagner, Chairman pro tem, and Commissioners Morris and Van Amringe. It was ordered that the Register of Deeds and Tax Collector be instructed to grant retail liquor licenses semi-annually. Article 5, section 2, of the Constitution of North Carolina and chapter 134, section 2, of the laws of 1873-74, providing that 25 per cent. of the poll-tax collected each year may be devoted to the support of the poor, it was thereupon ordered that 12 1/2 per cent. of the said poll-tax collected for the year 1874, be applied to the support of the poor of the county of New Hanover and that the Clerk of the Board notify Elijah Hewlett, County Treasurer, of the said order. The Board then adjourned.

Magistrate's Court.

Antonio Rush, a colored seaman employed on the Sch. Dorna Anna, was arraigned before Justice Van Amringe, yesterday morning, charged with shooting one Geo. Williams, also colored, and inflicting a wound in the arm. The affair took place some three or four weeks ago in the locality known as "Paddy's Hollow." The evidence indicating that the shooting was purely accidental the defendant was discharged.

In Good Condition.

The Conductors on the Carolina Central Railway report the whole line of road in good condition and rapidly improving, and all the trains running on the line; so, hereafter there will be no delay to either passengers or freight.

Local Notes.

Import Entries for sale at the office of THE MORNING STAR, 3t. — One hundred and one persons listed their taxes yesterday. — The Steamship Gulf Stream, from this port, arrived at New York yesterday. — Both printing and ruling done in the finest grades of copying ink at the STAR Job Printing Office. — The Weekly Post, of this city, has been considerably enlarged and otherwise improved in appearance. — The Front Street Hose Company were on duty yesterday, their motto being "down with the dust." — City subscribers who fail to receive their papers regularly will please report the fact promptly at this office. — The atmosphere has been laden with smoke, probably from fires in the woods in this vicinity, for the past day or two. — The morning and evening ante-communion services at the First Presbyterian Church arc, we learn, being well attended.

R. K. Bryan, Esq., accepts the nomination of the Democratic-Conservative party of Pender county for the office of Clerk of the Superior Court. — The City Clerk and Treasurer was busily engaged, yesterday, in making out warrants against delinquents who have not yet paid their special or monthly license tax.

The Government suction boat Woodward, in charge of Capt. J. W. Potter, which has been operating at the Bar for some time past, is now here undergoing repairs. — The tax-listers inform us that not one-fourth of those persons who are liable have yet listed their real and personal taxes for the present year. The time for listing expires two weeks from yesterday.

A meeting of the Democratic-Conservative Executive Committee of Pender county is to be held next Monday, 12th inst. There should be no absenteeism. A full turn out, prudent counsel and perfect organization are demanded. — The escaped prisoner arrested on Thursday night, whose name was given as Eli Johnson, was Eli Dudley Johnson, we learn, is a respectable colored cooper of this city, and we make this correction of a mistake made by our informant in justice to him. — The case of alleged larceny, in which an employe of the Railroad shops at Laurinburg was reported to have been fleeced to the extent of \$85, some mention of which was made in our last, was finally compromised and the party supposed to have been implicated was discharged from custody.

Mecklenburg Centennial.

The gentlemen who have been selected by the Central Executive Committee of the county of Mecklenburg and earnestly requested to act, as an Executive Committee for the county of New Hanover, in aid of the approaching 100th anniversary of the 20th of May, 1775, will meet at the residence of Mr. F. W. Kerchner this (Saturday) evening at 8 o'clock. The gentlemen constituting the Committee for the county of New Hanover are Messrs. W. A. Wright, J. A. Engelhard, A. M. Waddell, Junius Davis, E. D. Hall, Robert Strange, F. W. Kerchner, T. H. McKoy, S. L. Fremont, D. R. Murchison and W. H. Bernard. This committee has not as yet acted with as much energy as our friends in Mecklenburg should reasonably have supposed, and it is hoped that each and every member will be present at the meeting this evening, and that such measures will be there taken as will certainly secure appropriate action on the part of the county of New Hanover in connection with the celebration at Charlotte on the 20th of May next.

In the Wrong Box.

A police officer stationed at the head of the market, yesterday afternoon, noticed a colored boy, apparently about 15 or 16 years of age, putting something into an open fruit or vegetable box used by one of the hucksters. As the boy appeared to act in a somewhat confused manner the officer asked him what he was doing. SMITHVILLE.

Meeting of County Commissioners of Brunswick. The Board of County Commissioners of Brunswick county, as we learn from a correspondent, assembled on Monday at Smithville. But very little business was transacted of a public nature. The first business of general interest to the people of the county was the adoption of the following resolutions in respect to the death of Wesley Hodge, Esq., a former member of the Board.

WHEREAS, It has pleased Divine Providence in his inscrutable decrees to remove from our midst our associate County Commissioner, Wesley Hodge, Esq., and, whereas, we wish to record upon the records of Brunswick county a testimonial of the high esteem in which he was held as an efficient public officer; therefore, be it Resolved, By the Board of County Commissioners now in session, that we lament his death as a calamity to ourselves and to the people of the county, whose interest he was ever vigilant to protect, and we desire hereby to express ourselves of his merits by inscribing these resolutions upon the records of the county. Resolved, that the Clerk of this Board communicate to the friends of the deceased a copy of these resolutions, and express to them our sympathy in the loss they have sustained.

At the evening session, after the appointment of Tax-List Takers and the appointment of Inspectors of Election for the May elections in the town of Smithville, the Board received an application from one who deemed himself fully up to the mark, and in fact the only man in Northwest Township competent to wear the mantle of W. Hodge, Esq. The application called forth much merriment, especially from the audience, and was the occasion of many a jocular motion in reference to the same by them. The Commissioners, fully alive to the responsibility resting upon them, and highly appreciating the disinterested motive which actuated the applicant, concluded that the interests of the people of the county would be promoted by the gentleman's making a few more potatoes, a little more corn and a few more barrels of turpentine.

Real Estate and Loan Association—Annual Meeting.

The second annual meeting of the Stockholders of the Real Estate and Loan Association was held at the Hibernian Hall yesterday evening at 8 o'clock. On motion of Maj. T. H. McKoy, Mr. O. Garsley, Jr., was called to the chair, and C. S. Ellis, Esq., appointed Secretary. Messrs. Marsden Bellamy and R. F. Langdon were appointed a committee to verify proxies. The committee reported 391 shares represented in person and 149 by proxy, a total of 540 shares, being a majority of all the stock. The meeting was then declared organized for business. The Vice President of the Association, Maj. T. H. McKoy, (in the absence of the President) submitted the report of the Board of Directors, which, on motion, was received.

Maj. T. H. McKoy offered the following resolution:

Go ahead until you succeed. — During the last year there were 14 North Carolinians at Union (Presbyterian) Theological Seminary, Columbia. — The Raleigh and Davidson College Base Ball Clubs are making arrangements to be present at the Centennial. — The four negro robbers of the Barkdale, Va., depot, who fled to this State were arrested in Milton last Monday. The goods have not been found. — Presbytery of Concord meet at Cool Spring, Freden, on next Thursday, Rev. Taylor Martin, President of Simonton Female College, preaching the opening sermon. — The Advance calls on the Wilson Conservatives to hold their county convention at no distant time to make arrangements for the Convention campaign this summer. — The Convocation of Raleigh (of the Episcopal Church) will meet at St. Matthew's Church, Hillsboro, on Wednesday morning, April 14th, and hold its sessions morning and evening for three days. — Wilson Advance: Died at his residence in Warren on the 15th inst., W. K. Barham, in the 43rd year of his age. Mr. Barham was a lawyer of considerable talent and an excellent citizen. He formerly lived in Louisburg. — The Tarboro Southern thinks Edgecombe county would have a voice in the Constitutional Convention that would be respected if the large Radical majority would send such men as John Norfleet and Wm. H. Johnston, who are white Republicans. — Charlotte Observer: There has already been a response to the appeal of the Sec. of Ex. Com. C. A. for a real hornet's nest. Mr. W. H. Gregory has presented the Association with a nest, on which the patriotic hornets, who built it, have had the good taste to work the figures 1775.
