THE PRESS ON THE WAR-SHADOWS. Comments of the Berlin "Post" and Cologne "Gazette."

LONDON, April 10—6 A. M. The Berlin Post reverting to the subject of its leading article of yesterday says: "As long as Count Andrássy remains in office the good understanding between the three Emperors will continue, and there need be no fear of immediate war."

The Cologne Gazette, commenting on the Belgian difficulty, remarks that "Belgium may have been encouraged in her denial of the German demands by a neighboring power, whose able Minister of Foreign Affairs has certainly neglected no opportunity of opposing the interests of Germany."

THE PROPOSED PRESBYTERIAN CONFEDERATION. At the meeting of the committee appointed from most of the leading Presbyterian churches in this country, held in New York on Thursday evening, to take measures for joining in the proposed Presbyterian confederation in London, in July next, the Rev. Dr. McCosh, of Princeton College, gave a brief outline of the objects of the conference.

Rev. S. W. Westcott, of Smithville, died at Chapel Hill on Sunday, at 10 o'clock, of erysipelas in the throat. His remains arrived here yesterday afternoon and were received at the depot by Col. H. C. Leonard and Mr. E. Wescott, from whence they were taken in a hearse and carried to Smithville, the boat being in readiness to convey them. Mr. Westcott was quite a young man, being only about 27 years of age, and was a minister of the Baptist Church. He was formerly stationed at Newbern, but at the time of his death was pastor of the church at Chapel Hill, where his ability, as well as plain, unaffected piety had gained him many warm friends.

FALL OF A HOUSE—ONE PERSON KILLED AND SEVERAL INJURED. DANVILLE, April 9. About 2 o'clock this afternoon the large brick building on Main street, being erected by Messrs. E. L. & A. Gest for William F. Robinson, and which was nearly completed, fell in with a loud crash, the front wall falling entirely across the street. There were about thirty workmen working in different parts of the building, one of whom, a colored hod-carrier, was instantly killed. Several other negro workmen were injured—two seriously. Only two white men hurt. Mr. K. J. Wigglesworth, a gas-fitter from Richmond, was painfully, though not seriously injured. Mr. Albert Gest, one of the contractors, was slightly hurt.

Dr. Miller, of Charlotte, preached on both occasions, and his sermons were characterized by much ability. During the morning service there were forty-two additions to the membership of the church, thirty-two being admitted by examination and ten by letter.

Cleaning Up. W. H. Brooks, colored, a member of the police force, was yesterday appointed assistant health officer, to keep the market house and the crossings in the neighborhood clean. The party who formerly superintended this matter was discharged for not attending properly to his duties, especially in the vicinity of the lower part of the market.

IMPORTANT ARRREST. Arrest in Dallas, Texas, of a Former Sheriff of New Hanover County—His Arrival in Our Midst. Yesterday morning many of our citizens were surprised to learn of the arrival in our midst, in charge of an officer, of J. W. Schenck, Jr., former Sheriff of this county.

MECKLENBURG CENTENNIAL. Meeting of the New Hanover Committee—Arrangements, &c. The gentlemen composing the Executive Committee for this county in aid of the Mecklenburg Centennial, met Saturday evening and organized by electing Wm. A. Wright, Esq., Chairman.

SPORTS. Next season promises to be a gay one for the sportsmen of this city. The demand for breech-loaders is unabated; and the mania for high-bred field dogs is on the increase. We hear of several orders for pointers and setters of "blue-blood" pedigree. Some are to come from England, while others will come from the kennel of Mr. A. C. Waddell, of Newton, New Jersey, whose stock is said to be equal to any in the world.

Magistrate's Court. James Brinkley was arraigned before Justice VanAmringe, yesterday, charged with committing an assault on Jno. S. Piver, and was ordered to pay a fine of 50 cents and the costs.

Ordered Out of Port. The city authorities, in accordance with a notification from the Superintendent of Health, have ordered the removal to a position beyond the "Dram Tree" of the Spanish Barque Etina. This is the vessel in which a case of yellow fever was reported last summer, and which was detained at quarantine so long in consequence, being afterwards capsized in the heavy gale in September last, and remaining submerged in the water for several months. She was afterwards removed to one of the wharves on the west side of the river, where she has since been lying. As our authorities cannot well be too cautious under the circumstances we think their action in this case, under the suggestion of the Superintendent of Health, will meet with the general approval of our citizens.

A Serious Charge. A young colored man by the name of William Phinney was arrested yesterday on the charge of attempting rape on the person of a little colored child, about 7 years of age, by the name of Mary Bell Perkins, daughter of one Dennis Perkins, of this city. The crime is alleged to have been committed on or about the 4th of April. Defendant was ordered to give a justified bond in the sum of \$500 for his appearance before Justice VanAmringe this morning at 10 o'clock, in default of which he was lodged in jail.

Hymenaeal. The last Newbern Times says: "Bachelorhood loses another brilliant luminary in the person of the genial and clever Lieut. S. M. Crowley, of the revenue cutter Steens, who leaves this morning for Wilmington, to marry early the coming week a young lady of that city. May good luck attend him."
