The Historical Society.

An act to incorporate the Historical Society of North Carolina:

The General Assembly of North Carolina do enact, Section 1. The following named

persons, viz: William A. Graham, William Hooper, Thomas Atkinson, Charles Phillips, Fordyce M. Hubbard, Charles F. Deems, Braxton Craven, William H. Battle, Mathias E. Manly, Bartholomew F. Moore, Richmond M. Pearson, Edwin G. Reade, Nereus Mendenhall, John H. Wheeler, Zebulon B. Vance, Calvin II. Wiley, George Davis, William Eaton, Richard B. Creecy, Gen. D. II. Hill, S. D. Pool, W. C. Kerr, Win. Shakespeare Harris, K. P. Battle, G. D. Bernhelm, Geo. V. Strong, Cyrus L. Hunter and Cornelia Phillips Spencer, their associates and their successors, are created a body corporate, under the name of the Historical Society of North Carolina, with the powers conferred on corporations by the 26th chapter of Battle's Revisal, entitled "Corporations," as well as those conferred by this act.

Sec. 2. The first meeting of the members of said corporation shall be held at such time and place as the three first named in this act or either of them shall designate, at which meeting three shall be a quorum for the transaction of all business.

Sec. 3. Said corporation shall have power to make such rules, regulations and by-laws, in regard to the meetings of its members and the terms of their admission, the mode of voting, the functions of its officers, the number requisite to form a quorum, and all other matters relating to the government of the corporation, as may be deemed proper, not inconsistent with the laws of the land.

Sec. 4. The said corporation shall have authority to acquire such real and personal property as may be proper for carrying out the objects of its creation, especially books, manuscripts, documents, papers and me-morials of whatever kind, relating to the history of this State, particularly those possessed by the late Historical Society of North Carolina. It shall likewise be authorized to accept donations of money or property, for the purpose of enabling it to prosecute researches into said history and make publications relating thereto.

Sec. 5. The officer in charge of the Capitol shall be authorized to furnish said society a room in said building for the safe keeping of the books, papers and effects of the society, provided, that this can be done without inconvenience to any officer of the State, or to any officers or committees

of the General Assembly. Sec. 6. This act shall be in force

from its ratification. March, 1875.

Report of the Grand Jury.

The Grand Jury closed their labors yesterday and were discharged. After a visit to the jail, work house and poor house of the county, they made the following report: COUNTY OF NEW HANOVER. STATE OF NORTH CAROLINA Spring Term Superior Court.)

To the Hon. John Kerr, Judge Superior Court:

SIR:-The undersigned grand jurors for this term, beg leave to submit for your consideration, that on the 28th April 1875, they visited the county jail and found one woman (white), sick with rheumatism. She says she has had no physician or medicine and we would recommend that she should have attention immediately. We found the jail neatly kept, the floor well scoured, and the walls well whitewashed. We would recommend that the stove pipe be repaired and the free use of chloride of lime or some other disenfectant around and in the privies. We find in the jail several risoners who were put there on account of not being able to pay costs, &c., before some of the Magistrate's courts, and we would recommend that such prisoners who are able to work be sent to the work house to work out such sums as may be against them, thereby reducing the expense of the county some. The prisoners do not complain. They speak well of the jailor and seem satisfied as far as we are able to judge. We find the poor house in very good condition. The inmates speak in high terms of Dr. Scott, and say they believe he does all he can for them towards relieving them of

The prisoners say they are well treated, well worked and can enter no complaints towards the managers. The Spelling Bee.

In view of the early organization here of a spelling match, we append a few rules which we clip from an exchange, for the government of the same. A "Bee" for the purposes mentioned in our issue of yester-Those who have an idea of participating, can learn exactly what risk they run of "going down." No doubt dictionaries, spelling books and alas, primers will be in pretty general requsition by those desirous of reaping the laurels of a well contested bee. The following are the rules that govern such affairs throughout the North

1. The captains draw sides by lot. 2. A speller has but one trial at each

3. To set all at ease the dictator will begin with simple words-as ache, field, break-

4. Obsolete, provincial or technical words are not to be excluded, but with this proviso: That upon such word being given out any speller may have the right to object, stating his plea. The umpires will then de-cide whether said word be sufficiently objectionable to exclude it. No speller will be allowed to spell a word two ways without electing one mode as being positively

5. The speller may repeat the word after the leader, shall have the right to ask the meaning, or question the correctness of the pronunciation, or to correct his own spelling up to the pronunciation of the word after spelling the final syllable; but after the pronunciation no correction will be allowed. 6. Whenever a speller misses he shall go to the foot of his division, and on missing three words he shall take his seat.

7. Webster or Worcester shall be author ity on all disputed points. These rules are liberal enough, enabling the speller as he elects to avail himself of a the latitude in spelling.

It very often occurs that some of our citizens who own cows miss them and they arrive at the conclusion that their property has strayed into the woods. Recent developments, however, show that there exists in our city a gang of men who make it their business when they see a cow upon the street to drive it into the woods some distance from the city.
