An excursion party of the First Colored Baptist Church of Raleigh, numbering some 400, were in town on Saturday, and all seemed to be enjoying themselves.

It is proposed to erect in the public square, in the town of Shelby, a monument to commemorate the valor and heroism of Cleveland county's fallen sons, in the late war.

At the Conservative meeting in Raleigh last Saturday night, ex-Judge Battle presided, and speeches were made by Maj. Gales, Hon. W. N. H. Smith and Messrs. J. B. Batchelor and F. H. Busbee.

A Confederate General's Response to General Bartlett's Speech. The speech of General Bartlett, of Massachusetts, at the Lexington centennial banquet, in behalf of peace and union, has elicited the following response from General Fitzhugh Lee, who was a distinguished Confederate cavalry commander during the late war:

RICHLAND, STAFFORD CO., VA., April 27, 1875. GENERAL W. F. BARTLETT—My dear Sir: In common with many other ex-Confederate soldiers, with unfeigned pleasure I have read the remarks recently made by you at the Lexington-Concord celebration.

Just such soldierly sentiments, generously felt and expressed, will do more in a brief space of time towards restoring good feeling, fraternity and fellowship between the two sections of a common country than all the reconstruction eloquence of political partisans delivered during these past ten years—a period which you so truly say should have been sub liberate quietano.

Your words in reference to Federal soldiers are equally applicable to the Confederate soldiers, for they too "have a prejudice in favor of peace," and I fully agree with you that "between the soldiers of the two great sections of our great country fraternal relations were established long ago," and we feel that it such a felicitous companionship of sentiment could have found a resting place in the hearts of other classes of people, the rehabilitation of the South would long since have been assured.

Its speedy redemption from poverty and desolation would have followed, and once more, as in years ago, the North would have had the active co-operation of the South in working out a glorious destiny for the republic.

The science of government has been but little understood by those who, holding the reins of power since the war, have sacrificed public property to maintain party supremacy.

By carefully fostering the "meaner men for whom power is only a synonym for plunder," because, having abandoned principle for expediency, they could be added to party strength; by counseling harsh measures towards prostrate citizens to gratifying an unworthy vengeance; by refusing to listen to the voice of an impoverished people, accepting the result of a trial of arms, and asking to resume a condition of peace and subordination to the laws, our rulers have retarded the material progress of all sections of the country and all classes of its citizens.

As in the human body the soundness or decay of a limb will in time extend to and correspondingly affect the whole person, so must the political body be touched and moved by the condition of its component parts.

Therefore, when we hear such utterances fall from the lips of one who so bravely bore himself as a federal soldier, we begin to look forward with new hope and confidence to the day when the American flag, which now floats over the blue and gray, shall in truth be emblazoned with the emblem: "Peace on earth, good will to men."

Then, indeed, will fraternal feeling

be everywhere restored; then, indeed, will trade and commerce be revived between all portions of the country; then, indeed, will there exist in the hearts of the people that more perfect union which the founders of the republic intended, and to which we, the descendants, now renew an affectionate allegiance.

A meeting of the New Hanover Centennial Committee will be held at the room of the Cape Fear Club this (Tuesday) evening, at 6 o'clock.

Samuel Hurst, colored, arrested on a capias from Onslow county, charged with larceny, was sent on to that county yesterday by Sheriff Manning.

The City Clerk and Treasurer was engaged yesterday in making out warrants against persons who have failed to secure the necessary license tax according to law.

Rev. W. S. Black and Rev. J. T. Gibbs exchanged pulpits on Sabbath evening, the former occupying the pulpit of Fifth Street Methodist Church and the latter filling that of Front Street Church.

The regular monthly meeting of the Ladies' Benevolent Society will be held this (Tuesday) afternoon at 3 o'clock, at the Hall of the Hook and Ladder Company, on Dock street, between Third and Fourth streets.

The cases of Charles Henry, George Ellis, Negam Payne and Mathew Milton, all colored, charged with larceny, which were to have come up before Justice Van Amringe yesterday, were postponed until this morning.

Three persons received the ordinance of Baptism and four were admitted to church membership at the Front Street M. E. Church, South, on Sunday, and the Lord's Supper was administered to at least two hundred and fifty communicants.

For a few days past, many ladies—lovers of rare plants—have visited a private conservatory in this city which contains a most beautiful strange flower which is known as "The Veiled Nun." The flower is described as being the exact representation of a nun wearing a veil.

Pic-Nic and Target Shooting. The Cape Fear and Brooklya (colored) Fire Companies gave a picnic yesterday at Hilton. A large procession, composed of the above companies in full uniform, accompanied by a band of music, marched out and on the arrival of the procession at Hilton target shooting took place. The necessary arrangements had been made and quite an enjoyable day was spent. At the target shooting Jos. Howe won the first prize (a clock) and Geo. W. Betts won the second prize (a silver cup).

Magistrate's Court. A white boy by the name of William Savage was arraigned before Justice Gardner, yesterday morning, charged with obtaining money under false pretenses. The evidence was not sufficient to convict, and the case was dismissed.

U. S. District Court. The U. S. District Court for the District of Cape Fear, met in this city yesterday morning, His Honor Geo. W. Brooks presiding. The following business was transacted:

In the case of Monroe Smally & Co. vs. Solomon Levy, it appearing to the satisfaction of the Court that one-fourth in number of the creditors of the defendant do not petition in the case, or do not appear as petitioners, and it further appearing that there is not one-third in value of the aggregate amount of the debts of the defendant provable against the estate of the defendant in bankruptcy, on motion of Mr. Londop, Esq., of counsel for the defendant, Solomon Levy, it was ordered by the Court that the petition in this cause be dismissed, each party to pay their own costs.

A similar order was made in the case of Kohn, Allen & Co., vs. Solomon Levy. In the case of D. G. McKee, Assignee, vs. Hottendorf & Haskins, it was ordered that it be set for a hearing at the next term of the Court, with leave to either party to take depositions within three months upon five days notice to the opposite party.

Admiralty and bankruptcy causes will be heard to-day and the Government cases will come up on Wednesday. The Grand Jury will be drawn and charged to-day.

Robbery on Middle Sound. The residence of Mr. Jas. A. Hewlett, on Middle Sound, in this county, was entered on Saturday evening last, some time between 7 and 9 o'clock, during the temporary absence of the family, and robbed of a trunk containing money amounting to about \$100 in greenbacks and \$10 in specie, besides notes to the value of \$185. The trunk was subsequently found in the woods near by, with a quantity of jewelry and some papers of value remaining uncollected. Suspicion pointed to one David Nixon, colored, as the party guilty of the robbery and he was thereupon arrested and required to give a justified bond in the sum of \$1,000 for his appearance before Justice Jno. G. Wagner on Thursday next, in default of which he was lodged in jail.

When arrested with the money in his possession, Nixon declared that it was given to him by a colored man named Charles Harger, to be taken care of for him. Harger was also arrested and ordered to give bond in the sum of \$500 for his appearance at the same time with Nixon.
