Pythian Statistics. The Supreme Lodge of the World, Knights of Pythias, is now in session in Washington, with a very large attendance of delegates from all sections of the country. The Chancellors, report says that the Lodge in Montreal, Canada, has withdrawn from the jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge of Ontario, a new jurisdiction being claimed for Canada East. He also refers to the fact that Oahn Lodge of the Sandwich Islands, would, with the present interpretation of the word "white" in the constitution, be unable to admit the King to membership, and suggests action giving the word a more liberal interpretation. Dispensations have been granted to open lodges in Colorado, Wyoming and New Branswick, and applications for charters have been received from South Africa and Holland.
